

Nationals Out-Hit, Out-Pitch Americans for 4-1 All-Star Victory

MIGHTY SLUGGERS ARE HANDCUFFED IN EIGHT FRAMES

Vander Meer, Lee, Brown Turn in Fine Performance On National Mound—DiMaggio, Cronin Save Day

CROWLEY FIELD, Cincinnati, July 6.—(AP)—Brilliant pitching and timely hitting gave the National league all-stars a 4 to 1 victory over their American league rivals in the sixth annual charity battle between the two circuits before 28,000 spectators here today.

In scoring their second victory in the brief history of the series, the Nationals upset expert opinion and their pitchers throttled a batting array that had promised to pepper base hits all over the Ohio valley.

The three National pitchers Johnny Vander Meer, Bill Lee and Mace Brown, allowed the formidable American sluggers only seven hits and had them shut out until the last of the ninth, when hits by Joe DiMaggio and Joe Cronin gave the losers their only tally.

The Nationals, meanwhile, had pecked away at all three American league fingers, scoring once in the first inning, again in the fourth, and wrapping up the contest with a final two runs in the seventh when the losers' defense cracked wide open.

Vander Meer and Lee, who divided pitching duties for the first six innings, limited the Americans to a pair of hits. Brown gave up five in the final three and was slugged hard, but was saved by brilliant fielding.

FHA WILL INSURE BILLION VOLUME IN CONSTRUCTION

Administrator Assures President Total Will Be More Than Double Last Year — Picture Is Brightened

WASHINGTON, July 6.—(AP)—President Roosevelt heard today from Stewart McDonald, federal housing administrator, that the FHA would insure \$1,000,000,000 of new building this year.

McDonald reported to Mr. Roosevelt this total would be more than double that for last year.

Carrying numerous charts and tables to give Mr. Roosevelt a picture of the trend in home construction, McDonald said he reported the FHA did a \$96,000,000 business in the home mortgages during June, an increase of 74 per cent over the same month a year ago.

The total excluded \$17,000,000 in modernization and repair loans and \$8,000,000 in large-scale rental projects.

BOXMEN'S HURLER SPRAINS ANKLE IN HOME PLATE FALL

It was the first ball hit over the fence on the fly this year. Ray Hawk, Piche hurler, issued his first base on balls this season. He had faced 148 batters without giving free transportation.

Lillard Planning Team Grappling In Outdoor Opener

The wrestling boys are through with the Medford armory for the balance of the summer, when they go to the post again it will be under the stars and lights at the high school stadium.

That was the definite assurance given by Promoter Mack Lillard yesterday, and while he failed to announce the date for the gala open-air inaugural, he stated it would be either July 18 or July 25. There will be no grappling program next Monday.

The grunt and groan maestro is cooking up a spiffy dish for the out-of-doors opening, a dish the likes of which has never been tasted by local fans.

He is figuring on staging one of those famous team matches, one of those man-vs.-man clean affairs that have kept Portland customers in a dither for some time. He tentatively plans to send two clean and scientific matmen against a pair of brutal villains, with orders to shoot the works and let the devil take the hindmost.

Just who will battle who is not yet decided, but Sockeye Jack McDonald, the great ex-Seattle logger, is almost certain to be a member of the man-vs.-man duo. Sockeye was released from the hospital last week where he had lingered while infection in his leg was treated, and Lillard said he would be ready to go. McDonald injured his underarm in the Christy match here two weeks ago. Others who may get in on the team battle, if it is arranged, are Christy and Bobby Chick. Dude Chick won't be among those present, as he is leaving immediately for a series of matches in Los Angeles and the east.

It will be a 50 percent new Crater infield on display Sunday when Medford clashes with Yreka at the local park in the first game of the Southern Oregon league's second-half pennant race. Hale Greeman, husky power hitter of the Junior Craters, will be on third base in place of Arba Ager, who was released to sign with Ashland, and Billy Calvert, rifle-armed outfielder, will be on second base in place of Manager Wally Rickett, who will move into the outer garden. Bob Smith on first and Dick Lewis at short will be in their regular positions.

Remainder of the Crater team will spread out in the usual fashion, with Cliff McLean back of the plate, Lowell Brown on the mound, and Hoffard, Sakrada and Rickett in the outfield. Tommy White, young out-fielding sensation, is still a doubtful starter Sunday. His cracked wrist is still on the mend and Manager Rickett doesn't believe he will be able to play for another two weeks.

Doctor's Four - Bit Words Leave Ring Racket Wozy

WASHINGTON, July 6.—(AP)—Lieut. J. A. Millsapugh of the naval medical corps has dealt the boxing business a scholastic wallop with a brand new treatise on punch drunkenness.

Punch drunkenness isn't a condition you get into from drinking punch, but a condition you get into from absorbing too many punches.

Writing in the naval medical bulletin, Lieut. Millsapugh proposes a new name for it—dementia pugilistica.

That's all right, lieutenant, but you gave the boxing trade a verbal knockout with this punchy paragraph:

"Patently the etiology of dementia pugilistica is trauma." After the budding heavyweight has waded through that bit of business on what might happen to him if he gets hit too much, the lieutenant issues out with:

"The metacarpophalangeal articulations are usually hyperthrophied." Sock!

If that doesn't frighten him into a neutral corner of his living room, how about some of the things the lieutenant says are symptoms of dementia pugilistica?

"Scowling, snorting, blowing, grimacing, crouching, and squaring off," he writes, "are commonly witnessed." Finally, if the fighter wants to know the medical analysis of what happens to him when he comes to after being knocked out, he can get it toward the end of the treatise.

"Where is he the defeated inquirer, stimulating aggressive tactics." Here, however, he'll probably take issue with Lieut. Millsapugh, for the prize-fighting profession has long echoed with these words of the K. O'd boxer:

"Where's he at, the big bum? Gimme a return match."

TENNIS STAR'S RITES LIKE STATE CEREMONY

PARIS, July 6.—(AP)—Representatives of royalty and the French government and famous figures of sports attended the funeral today of Suzanne Lenglen, former queen of the tennis world who died Monday. She was buried in the Lenglen family plot in Saint-Ouen cemetery.

King Gustav of Sweden, the 80-year-old tennis enthusiast, sent the Swedish minister to represent him, and the funeral took on the aspect of a state ceremony, with representatives of Premier Edouard Daladier and various government departments present.

Such famous tennis players as Jean Borotra, Jacques Brugnon, Bernard Destremau and Christian Bouteux were among the many who attended at Notre Dame de L'Assomption church and followed the casket to the cemetery, where Borotra delivered a funeral oration.
