

NORTON AFFIRMED IN WATER USE SUIT

SALEM, July 6.—(AP)—The state supreme court today reversed Circuit Judge Latourette of Marion county in a suit brought by the State Savings and Loan association to recover approximately \$30,000 from C. C. Bryant, as receiver for the First National Bank of Salem, an insolvent national banking association.

The lower court held for the receiver, whereupon the savings and loan association appealed.

The court affirmed Circuit Judge Norton in a suit brought by Mary Messinger against Ernest Woodcock, for a decree declaring the plaintiff entitled to the use of all water arising from Messinger springs and flowing in Messinger creek upon plaintiff's farm in Josephine county. The lower court held against the plaintiff.

Bolt Kills Three In Canadian Mine

FERNIE, B. C., July 6.—(UP)—A bolt of lightning penetrated the Crow's Nest Pass coal company mine 24 miles northeast of here today, causing an explosion of black damp gas that killed three miners.

Fourteen other men who were laying new pipe lines in the mine escaped with no injury other than being stunned.

The dead were Ed Morrison, John Phillips, 32, and William Cartwright, 44.

The lightning struck the coal car company railway track outside the mine and was conveyed inside the digging to a "pocket" of gas.

Billion In Silver To New U. S. Cache

WEST POINT, N. Y., July 6.—(AP)—The first of \$1,200,000,000 worth of Uncle Sam's bar silver reached the government's new storage vault here today.

Starting a ten-months transfer job, trucks, each carrying nearly 12 tons of the metal from the government assay office in New York City, covered the 80-mile trip without incident.

Mrs. Nellie Taylor Ross, director of the mint, was en route here to supervise transfer of the silver to the new vault.

Call Bids On Wire For Bonneville Dam

PORTLAND, July 6.—(AP)—J. D. Ross, administrator of Bonneville dam, forwarded to leading cable and wire companies today a call for bids on a million and a half pounds of high voltage transmission conductors, either copper or aluminum, to be used for the 36-mile line that will bring power from the dam to Vancouver, Wash.

From Vancouver, the power will be distributed into Oregon and Washington. Bids will be opened August 10 here.

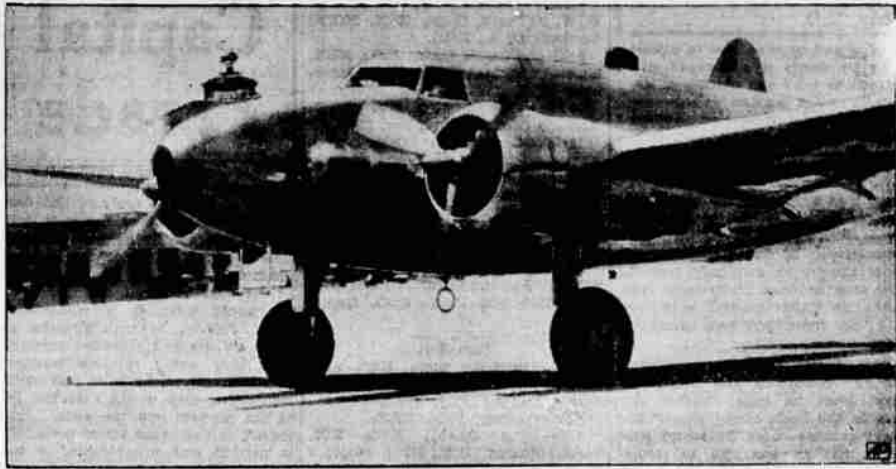
La Guardia Avoids City Hall Pickets

Gov. Marland To Be Nice Though F. R. Favors Foe

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 6.—(AP)—Gov. E. W. Marland promised today he would try to make President Roosevelt's visit here Saturday pleasant "even though the president be coming to Oklahoma for the sole purpose of helping Senator Thomas, as Senator Thomas says."

Marland, an avowed new dealer, Thomas and Rep. Gomer Smith are rivals for the Democratic senatorial nomination in Tuesday's primary.

Mr. Roosevelt has reported he would say a few kind words. Many Oklahomans think they'll be a pat for Thomas.

Several weeks ago, when the president's western tour was announced, Marland wrote Roosevelt urging him not to come to Oklahoma until after the primary. But Marland suggested that he receive every Democratic

secretary, asked Marland if he expected to meet the president "on arrival at Oklahoma City or where?"

"I'll be Oklahoma City," Marland wired back. "You have left me no opportunity to meet him elsewhere."

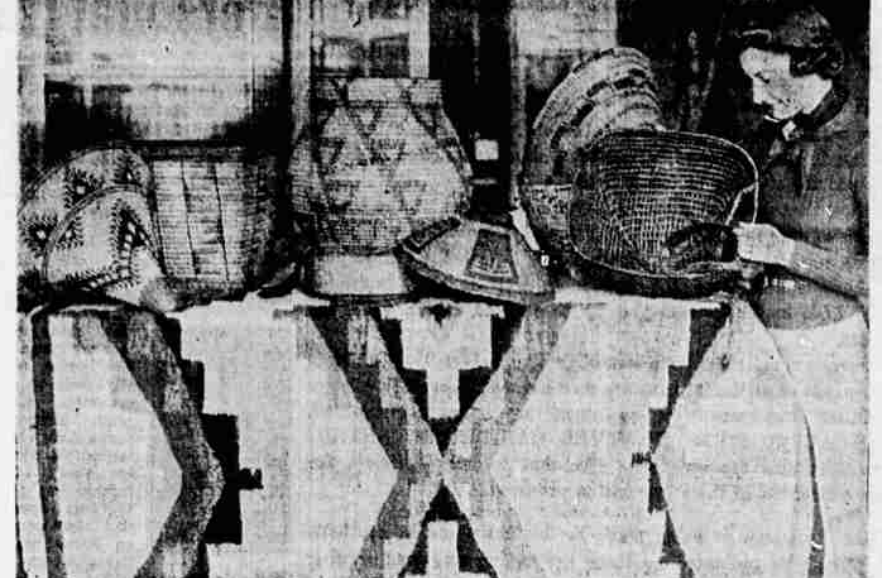
Last night Marland told a crowd at Shawnee:
