NEW YORK, July 6.—(AP)—The buying urge came to the surface of the stock market again today after a moderate setback from the steep midday advance had run its course. A late wave of orders, concentrated mostly on coppers, oils and other industrial groups, gave the market a vigorous shove upward, overcoming the hesitancy that prevailed most of the session. Early losses running to more than 2 points in representative issues were replaced by gains that ranged to 4 points in the strongest movers. Trading slowed almost to a standstill on the sell-off, making a noticeable contrast with the buying stampede, then picked up when the rally got going. Transactions approximated 1,600,000 shares. Some stocks swept ahead to new highs for the bull movement on the late buying wave, notably among the mining, oil and miscellaneous industrial groups.
