## EX-SECRETARY OF TEAMSTER UNION SURPRISE WITNESS

Rosser Defense Places Al Banks On Stand at Trial On Arson — Animosity Toward Box Factory Told

DALLAS, Ore., July 7.—(AP)—In a surprise move just before noon recess in the trial of Al Rosser, Portland, former secretary of the joint A.F.L. Council of Teamsters for Oregon, charged with arson in connection with the destruction of the West Salem box factory last November 20, Al Banks, former secretary of the Salem teamsters now serving a 12-year sentence for arson in the same case, was placed on the stand by the defense.

Banks identified the confession he made to state police last February and defense attorney George Vanderveer, Seattle A.F.L. attorney, read it in part:

"I developed the idea that the only way to deal with him (Rosser) was to put him out of business and destroy his plant."

Under cross-examination Banks explained he made this statement because he was told not to implicate anyone else.

"That whole story was milled over in my mind for several hours, for the purpose of exonerating everyone but myself," he said. "I had been told not to talk. I thought I would take the blame because I had been identified as the fellow 'who paid them' (referring to John Newlands, Ernest Carson and Cecil Moore who have confessed)."

Advised to Keep Mute Banks quoted Roy Hewitt, Salem attorney, as saying to him:

"There is no use to involve anyone else as the governor is going to railroad you to the penitentiary."

He was still on the stand at the noon recess.

Rosser Reynolds, of Eugene, former secretary of the joint Salem-Eugene Council of Teamsters, took the stand for the defense at the opening of the trial this morning.

Reynolds testified that he asked the joint council to take Salem "off his hands" in June, 1937, and that he was relieved of his duties by Al Banks, former business agent, in January of this year. No one, he declares, was authorized to take money out of the union cash funds and replace it with IOUs. Banks had previously said that it was customary to "tap the till" in this manner.

Reynolds said he objected to Banks' writing checks and that over \$200 had been charged to the organization but he did not know for what purpose. When he asked Banks about it, Banks told him that it was "for the benefit of the boys," he declared.

Upon cross examination Reynolds denied that he had ever talked to Rosser about the way Banks handled affairs but a few minutes later said:

"I told Mr. Rosser that Banks did not know the value of money or how to handle money." This was shortly after the fire and he again asked Rosser to be relieved at once, he said.

Banks was then promoted from business agent and took over the secretarial duties at Salem.

Asked by Special Prosecutor Oscar Hayer if he had ever been convicted of a crime, Reynolds replied:

"Yes—on a frame up." He referred to the breaking of barber shop windows in Eugene.

Dave O'Hara, state superintendent of elections in the office of the secretary of state, was called to the stand in connection with commutation papers in the sentencing of Fred Upon and Harold Beltz, who had testified at the trial of Dave Rutz, business agent for the teamsters at The Dalles, who was convicted in a tractor sabotage case. The papers tended to show that the two men were offered leniency if they would testify for the state.

Objection by the state was sustained by Circuit Judge Arlie G. Walker, who is hearing the case.

## CROWN PRINCE STANDS SOCIAL VENTURE WELL

NEW YORK, July 7.—(AP)—Crown Prince Gustaf Adolf of Sweden was reported in "very good" condition today at Harkness Pavilion at the medical center where he returned last night after attending a luncheon and a banquet in his honor yesterday.

The heir to the throne of Sweden had been a patient at the hospital for nine days until yesterday. He was stricken with a kidney ailment while aboard ship en route to the United States to participate in ceremonies attendant upon the 300th anniversary of the landing of Swedes in the Delaware valley.

Hospital attaches said he was resting comfortably despite the rigors of yesterday's social affairs.

## Jantzen Preferred Dividend Declared

SAN FRANCISCO, July 7.—(AP)—Jantzen Knitting Mills directors took no action toward a dividend on common stock but announced today the regular quarterly \$1.25 on preferred stock would be paid Aug. 31 to stockholders of record Aug. 25.

The company has paid 75 cents on common stock this year. Chairman J. A. Zehntbauer said the payment thus far on common is "liberal" in view of operating results for the fiscal year ending Aug. 31.

## UNION CHECK FORGER IS SENT TO PRISON

HOOD RIVER, July 7.—(AP)—A sentence of not more than five years in prison was imposed on Stanley Brown, former business manager of the C.I.O. Sawmill Workers' union at Hood, upon his plea of guilty to 11 counts of forgery.

Brown was charged with forging the signature of the union president on checks with which he withdrew union funds.

## MARK FAVORITE IN STATE NET TOURNNEY

PORTLAND, July 7.—(AP)—The Oregon state tennis tournament's No. 2 seeded player, Ed Amark, San Francisco, slipped into the favorite's spot and the quarter finals yesterday by defeating Tom Brown, Jr., Portland, 5-0, 6-2.

Sam Lee, defending champion, previously was eliminated by Howard Morehouse, California junior ace who beat Bob Gray, Portland, 6-1, 6-2.

Other results, showing victors into higher brackets, included:

Harold Wagner, San Francisco, beat Francis Lewis, Seattle high school star, 1-6, 6-3, 6-2; Emory Neale, Oregon interscholastic champion, beat Bob Odman, Seattle, 2-6, 6-4, 6-1.
