LENGTHY LIST OF PETITIONS FILED FOR VOTER ACTION

SALEM, July 7.—(AP)—Voters of Oregon, at the November election, will approve or reject at least six initiative measures, three constitutional amendments, one bill and two referendum measures, records of the state department disclosed today. The time for filing completed petitions for initiative measures and constitutional amendments at the November election expires tonight. Preliminary petitions for 24 of these measures and amendments were filed in the state department.

Four From Legislature — Three proposed constitutional amendments and one bill were referred by the 1937 legislature. These were: Allowing the governor 20 days, instead of five days, after final adjournment of the legislature, to approve or veto bills. Repealing the double liability provision involving stockholders in banking corporations.

Fixing the maximum compensation of legislators at \$8 per day, instead of \$3, and limiting the length of regular legislative sessions to 50 days instead of 40 days; Special legislative sessions would be restricted to 20 days. Presiding officers, including the president of the senate and speaker of the house, would receive two-thirds daily pay additional.

Requiring both men and women to submit to physical examination for marriage licenses and that physicians' certificates shall show applicants free from contagious or infectious venereal disease, epilepsy, feeble-mindedness, insanity, drug addiction or chronic alcoholism. Blood tests would be required. Applicants denied licenses would have the right of appeal.

The two referendum measures are directed at anti-gambling bills approved by the 1937 legislature. One was known as senate bill No. 17, and was introduced by Senator Carney of Clackamas county. The other was house bill No. 159, by Representative Hannah Martin of Marion county.

These bills outlawed slot machines, pinball, dart and other similar games. Referendum petitions against these bills were sponsored by Oscar T. Olson and others of Portland.

Initiative measures follow: Providing for the purification of the waters of rivers, streams, lakes, watersheds and coastal area of Oregon, establishing a sanitary authority for administration, and setting up regulations for elimination of pollution, sewage and other wastes. This measure was filed by the Stream Purification League of Oregon, of which State Treasurer Rufus C. Holman is president.

For the regulation of picketing and boycotting, defining a labor dispute and fixing penalties for violation. A labor dispute under this measure is defined as a bona fide controversy between employer and employees relative to wages, working hours or working conditions. This bill was sponsored by the Associated Farmers of Oregon and other farm organizations and is directed particularly at labor organizations. Authorizing and directing the state legislature to apply to congress for a convention to propose the philosophy and principles of the Townsend national recovery plan as an amendment to the federal constitution. (Filed by Oregon Townsend organizations).

Providing maximum annuity of \$100 a month for all persons who have attained the age of 65 years, provided they shall not engage in any gainful pursuit. Annuity would be financed by two percent transaction tax, with certain transactions exempted. (Initiated by Elbert Eastman, Portland).

Prohibiting the use of seines and other fixed appliances in the Columbia river. (By Oregon Wildlife Council.)

Placing the sale of all alcoholic beverages in state liquor stores and transferring four percent of receipts of liquor control commission for scientific research. In case of violations, liquor control commission would be liable for damages. (By Anti-Liquor League of Oregon.)
