STATE DEMOCRATS HOPE FOR PEACE

PORTLAND, July 9.—(AP)—Nadie Strayer, Baker, acting chairman of the state Democratic central committee, effectively removed speculation today about her plans for the committee's annual meeting here next Saturday by saying she was "not a candidate for the state chairmanship."

"The first reason for my action is that I think a better hand can be found for the job," she said in a letter. "My other reason is that I am hoping, by not pressing the advantage I hold, to help bring about a peaceful solution of the problem."

Miss Strayer said she had held her position by "courtesy" of the committee since the resignation of Claude McCulloch, when he became a federal judge. "The term is up; very well. I'll stop here where I can consider my obligation fulfilled," she declared.

Punchboard Crusade Promised Mothers

PORTLAND, July 9.—(AP)—Mayor Joseph K. Carson promised two mothers that he would investigate their charges that punchboards were running promiscuously in this city and that policemen had told them the law against the board could not be enforced.

The two women protested the punchboards to the council. The mayor said he intended to see that anti-gaming laws were enforced with all others and that while complete enforcement might not be possible, "we shall do the best we can."

STATE CIVIL WAR HEROES RETURN

PORTLAND, July 9.—(AP)—The boys in blue and one in gray hopped off a train today, back home after their historic reunion at Gettysburg, where they fought once again but this time bloodlessly, the greatest battle of the Civil war 75 years ago.

"Oh, sure, we had a rattlin' good time," snapped one Joseph W. Ridge, 62, adjutant-general of the G.A.R. in Oregon. He was going strong. The only ailing member was Wesley Loney, Woodburn, but he wasn't "Allin' much."

"Couldn't have been better," continued Ridge, speaking about the celebration. "We were treated fine; we saw and heard great things and we're mighty glad we got to go back."

Capt. John W. Cullin, spy at 100, said the Oregon delegation was the "first to arrive, first to be tented and first to dine."

"Fine, fine!" was the universal exclamation on how they had enjoyed themselves. They showed it the way they got off the train. A conductor had wired ahead for wheel chairs but Loney suffering from a cold was the only one who used a chair.

CIO AGITATION IN IOWA STRIKE HELD

NEWTOWN, Iowa, July 9.—(AP)—Robert Kirkwood, secretary of the Maytag CIO union, was arrested by Sheriff Earl Shilde today on a charge of criminal syndicalism.

Kirkwood was the sixth union man to be arrested in connection with labor disturbances at the Maytag plant, closed two months ago when 14,000 workers walked out in protest against a 10 per cent wage cut.

Kirkwood was seen at the picket lines with officers after his arrest. He was helping check the names of the 47 office workers and company officials allowed to enter the plant for the first time since Tuesday.

Meanwhile, Labor Conductor Frank E. Wenigh declared union officials understood the work of the arbitration board requested last night by Governor Nelson G. Krasch will be on wages only and will include the 10 per cent wage cut, chief point of controversy between the union and company.

NICHOLSON BARN FLAME DEVoured

Fire early last evening destroyed a barn on the Nicholson place on Rose lane. Some machinery in the barn was also destroyed, the state fire warden's office reported. Cause of the fire was not determined.

The premises are occupied by Theodore O. Webster, employe of the C. E. Gates Auto company. Mr. Webster was at work when the fire occurred.

Four men and a pumper truck were sent to the fire by the state fire warden's office and a chemical truck was dispatched from city fire headquarters. The barn, however, was too far gone to be saved when the firemen received the call.

EX-SOLON'S WIFE FACES LABOR ROW

KANSAS CITY, July 9.—(AP)—Mrs. Donnelly Reed, a pioneer woman industrialist, today faced a threat of the International Ladies' Garment Workers union to use its "full force" to organize her women's wear plant after losing an important court battle against picketing.

Federal Judge John Caskie Collet late yesterday dismissed a temporary injunction restraining the international union from picketing the \$1,000,000 Donnelly Garment Co. He granted the union the right to attempt to organize the employees. He also dissolved the company's bill of complaint against the union, ruling the federal court had no jurisdiction in the dispute under the Norris-LaGuardia act.

Mrs. Reed and her husband, the fiery former U. S. Senator James A. Reed, long have contended the Donnelly company pays higher wages than the union scale, that its working conditions are better than in union plants and that its 870 employes prefer their own union to the I. L. G. W. U.
