Mrs. Egan will have charge of the sponsoring membership sale in the Medford area for the fourth annual Shakespearean festival in Ashland which will be held August 8 to 19. She will select her own committee of aides and it is anticipated that she will announce its personnel within a few days.

Sponsoring members are entitled to attend all of the productions which this year, as in the past, will be held in the Ashland Elizabethan theater which bears a striking resemblance to the old Globe theater of Shakespeare's day and which has as a background the picturesque Litchia park.

In announcing that Mrs. Egan had consented to serve as committee chairman, the festival association said it was fortunate in procuring the assistance of one who has been so closely identified with the cultural life of southern Oregon. Mrs. Egan has long been interested in the theater and it is felt that her understanding of theatrical productions, both from the practical and artistic viewpoints, will be of inestimable help in attaining an outstanding success in this year's festival.

The Shakespearean festival has come to be one of the major social as well as theatrical events of the year in Oregon. While the social phase is not stressed, the festival standing squarely on its own feet as a purely theatrical venture, the Shakespearean productions do appeal to the elite of southern Oregon and society is eagerly anticipating this year's colorful presentations.

LEE H. WAKEFIELD CALLED BY DEATH

Lee H. Wakefield, well known and highly respected citizen of the Jacksonville district, passed away at his home there Monday at 9:30 p. m. after a few weeks illness from a heart ailment. Mr. Wakefield was born in

Beatty, Kas., September 23, 1888. He spent his early life and gained his education in Kansas, and later met and was united in marriage to Miss Mary Schoneberg at Marysville, Kas., Nov. 8, 1908. They moved to Oklahoma after their marriage where they lived for seven years, coming to southern Oregon in 1919.

He was a farmer by occupation and was very much liked and admired by all who knew him. A wonderful husband and father, he will be missed by a host of friends.

Besides his wife, he leaves three daughters, Mrs. Virgil Swanson and Mrs. Frank Shaw of Medford, and Miss Frances Wakefield, at home. A son, Harold, passed away in 1927. FOSSIL REMAINS IN LOCAL C. OF C.

Teeth and part of a tusk of a prehistoric animal were today added to the Southern Oregon Gem and Mineral society's exhibit in the front show window of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce. The fossils were found last week at the Sterling mine in the Applegate, second remains of prehistoric animals found there in recent weeks.

The teeth are in double rows and are rectangular in shape with flat surfaces.

The fossils were removed from the earth by E. R. Santo, president, and William H. McClure, second vice-president of the gem and mineral society. They were treated for preservation before being placed on display.

The imprint of the whole animal was discernible but water from the mining operations had caused the

body to disintegrate. Mr. Santo said. The imprint, he added, indicated the animal was about nine feet long with a tusk spread of five feet. The fossil was buried between 10 and 12 feet underground.
