- 4-200-foot free style.
- 5-Plunge for distance.
- 6-Underwater swim.
- 7-Diving.
- 8-Comic stunts.
- 9-Life-saving demonstration.
- 10-Ring buoy rescue.
- 11-Exhibition diving.
- 12-Bathing beauty contest.
- 13-Free style relay, corps areas competing.
- 14-Presentation of awards.

## TIDE OF BATTLE FAVORS CHINESE ON UPPER RIVER

Defenders' Planes Continually Raiding Japanese Forces — Japs Fail to Advance in Three Days

SHANGHAI, July 15.—The tide of battle appeared today to be turning to favor the Chinese along the upper Yangtze river, after damaging attacks by Chinese warplanes.

Chinese announced that their airmen continually were raiding Japanese forces, both military and naval, below Kiukiang, which the Japanese have been unable to conquer in two weeks of bitter fighting.

Kiukiang is 135 miles from Hankow, seat of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's government and the ultimate objective of the Japanese offensive.

For three days now the Japanese have made no marked advance, and Chinese insist their drive has been brought to a halt. Japanese were silent today, presumably considering the Chinese reports unworthy of comment.

While there was no positive evidence to support the Chinese claim, it is fairly well established that the Chinese aerial force in recent days has damaged several Japanese craft. Some in damaged condition were seen being towed down river.

The Chinese high command in Hankow asserted 45 enemy war vessels had been sunk or damaged in the last two weeks, and 19 of the ships were reported towed to Shanghai for repairs.

Japanese put forth counter claims that their bombers had punished Chinese over a wide area. In a twilight raid on Hankow yesterday, Japanese said they bombed ten Chinese planes on the ground, seriously damaging all, and then shot down one plane which took to the air in combat.
