

PHYSICIANS HEAP SHARP CRITICISM ON HEALTH PLAN

American Medical Association President Says Government Program Would Not Work—Rebel Replies

WASHINGTON, July 20. — (AP) — Officials of the American Medical Association heaped criticism today on a presidential committee's recommendation for an \$850,000,000 government health program.

The far-reaching venture, proposed to the national health conference yesterday, would have two general aims:

1. It would expand general public health facilities to try to eradicate tuberculosis, venereal diseases and malaria and to control pneumonia and cancer deaths, and develop maternal and child health centers.

2. It would use some state, local and federal funds to build hospitals to maintain free beds, and give grants-in-aid for research.

Raise Dispute.
Presentation of the proposal by a committee on medical care appointed by President Roosevelt started an immediate dispute.

Dr. Irvin Abell of Louisville, Ky., president of the A. M. A., termed the program unworkable. Dr. Hugh Cabot of the Mayo clinic, Rochester, Minn., a leader of the "rebel" group in the medical association, replied:

"Maintenance of the standards of medical practice by the medical profession as at present organized has been grossly unsatisfactory."

Dr. Olin West, secretary of the A. M. A., and Dr. Morris Fishbein, editor of the association's journal, joined Dr. Abell in preparing a more complete criticism of the proposal.

Requirements Vary.
In his first comment, Dr. Abell argued that further studies were needed because medical requirements varied widely in different localities. He added:

"Those people who think that they can devise a centrally controlled medical service plan which can be fitted to the varying conditions of the state, counties and cities of this country are discussing theories which no practical health administrator could possibly approve."

Dr. Cabot said he did not feel much confidence in the results of the A. M. A. survey of medical needs. He asserted thousands of persons lacked medical care while thousands of young physicians "are starving to death."

Clifford E. Waller, assistant surgeon-general of the public health service, presented a part of the program dealing with expansion of general health services which alone would provide up to \$100,000,000 annually for public health medical care during the next seven years.

Under the program, \$23,000,000 would be spent in strengthening public health departments in states and counties; \$43,000,000 for the control of tuberculosis; \$47,000,000 for control of venereal diseases; \$22,000,000 for the reduction of pneumonia mortality; \$25,000,000 for cancer control; \$10,000,000 for malaria control; \$10,000,000 for dental hygiene, and \$20,000,000 for industrial hygiene.

Huge Infant Life Waste.
In an analysis of the general health program, Dr. Martha M. Elliot, assistant chief of the children's bureau, asserted that "today there is a great and infatigable shrivel of infant life," much of which could be prevented.

As many as 70,000 lives could be saved each year, she said, under the proposed health program in which the federal government would spend the first year \$4,500,000 for maternity care, \$3,000,000 for medical care of children and \$2,000,000 for services for crippled children.

These funds could be gradually increased, Dr. Elliot added, until by the tenth year \$47,800,000 would be spent for maternity care and care of new-born infants; \$30,000,000 for medical care of children and \$8,000,000 for aid to crippled children.

WORLD TRAVELER TELLS ROTARY OF JUNGLE VENTURES

Captain Willard C. Bush, big game hunter, world traveler and author of the new book "Pahang," described his experiences in Malaysia before the Medford Rotary club at the Hotel Medford, Tuesday noon. His listeners were thrilled with Captain Bush's graphic account of an elephant hunt in the wildest Malayan jungles and a gripping encounter with a tiger.

Captain Bush, who resided in this city several years ago, and now makes his home in Salem, was manager of a rubber plantation at Pahang. His experiences and observations in a jungle teeming with wild animals, snakes, poisonous spiders, scorpions and centipedes, were most entertainingly presented.

"You can't walk through the Malayan jungles, you have to crawl," Captain Bush told the Rotarians in describing his exciting trip into the interior where a rubber plantation was carved out of the wilderness. Handicaps encountered in clearing the jungles and planting were vividly told.

The rubber trees are planted in rows, 24 feet apart and in 40-acre blocks, Bush told his audience. He gave a verbal picture of the colorful natives employed to patrol the seven-foot plantation fences and tap the trees for creamy rubber.

Eleanor T. MacMillan's interesting review of Captain Bush's exciting book "Pahang," appeared in the March 6 issue of the Oregon Journal. In this review, Mrs. MacMillan calls "Pahang" one of the "most exciting and authentic jungle books."

"The account teems with one exciting episode after another as the so-called 'mad Yank' tells how he landed in Singapore with \$1.40 in his pocket, finally obtained a billet as manager of a rubber plantation and started on a career which entailed fighting everything from wild beasts to invisible perils. Soldiers of fortune and progressive planters stride through the pages. Native chatter volubly over any departure from their customs which are as skillfully incorporated into the recital of events. Reptiles glide through breathless paragraphs and man-eating tigers lurk in every chapter.

"There is a blending of natural history, geography, political economy, industrial analysis and thrilling narrative all in one volume. It alternates between virile action and colorful description, while the introduction, philosophical interludes and the well-wooded conclusions add poetic beauty. The author wields his pen with the same deftness with which he flings a wicked six-footer and this diversified chronicle should reach the top round of best-sellerdom within its travel-adventure classification.

"The book is not only well written but is artistically presented with appropriate format and end paper maps. It is a masterpiece of both literary and publication craftsmanship."

POSTPONE WINDUP OF ORCHARD CASE

Hearing in the case of Tom L. Taylor, orchardist, against the state department of agriculture, the county agent and a fruit inspector, seeking a permanent injunction against blight cutting on the Taylor orchard, was continued Tuesday until September 6, by Circuit Judge H. D. Norton.

The action was taken when it developed the taking of testimony would require two more days and interfere with the calendar. Three days are allowed for completion of the case in September.

Six fruitmen and expert blight cutters were called as witnesses by the plaintiff. Burden of the testimony was that the Taylor orchard was free from blight than the average local orchard, and otherwise in good condition.

The injunctive relief was sought, following removal last December of a number of pear trees on the Taylor orchard. Taylor also originally sought \$5000 damages. This was withdrawn. Taylor's attorneys said it would probably be renewed later.

COURT HEARS SUIT OVER AUTO INJURY

A circuit court jury was drawn today to hear testimony in the damage suit of Ponce Leonard against Craig M. Cooper and wife, for \$3000, for alleged injuries received by Leonard on the night of December 22, last, while walking on the old Pacific highway.

Leonard claims he was struck by the auto driven by Cooper, while walking on the highway, and sustained a fractured left leg and ankle, a broken rib and hip, and spinal bruises. Forces of the impact knocked Leonard ten feet and incapacitated him from following the blight-cutting trade for some time, he claims. Negligence in driving to alleged against the defendants.

Leonard was returning from a visit to a neighbor's house when the accident occurred. The plaintiff is represented by Attorney George M. Roberts and W. M. McAllister and the defendants by Attorney Gus Newbury and Don R. Newbury.

ACQUIT HUENENMILLER ON DRUNK DRIVE COURT

Emil Huenenmiller, charged in a state complaint with driving an auto while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, was acquitted by a justice court jury Tuesday afternoon. The complaint charged the offense was committed on the Pacific highway, about a week ago. The verdict was returned after short deliberation.
