Olive Rebekah lodge met in regular session Monday evening at the I. O. O. F. hall and installed officers for the ensuing year.

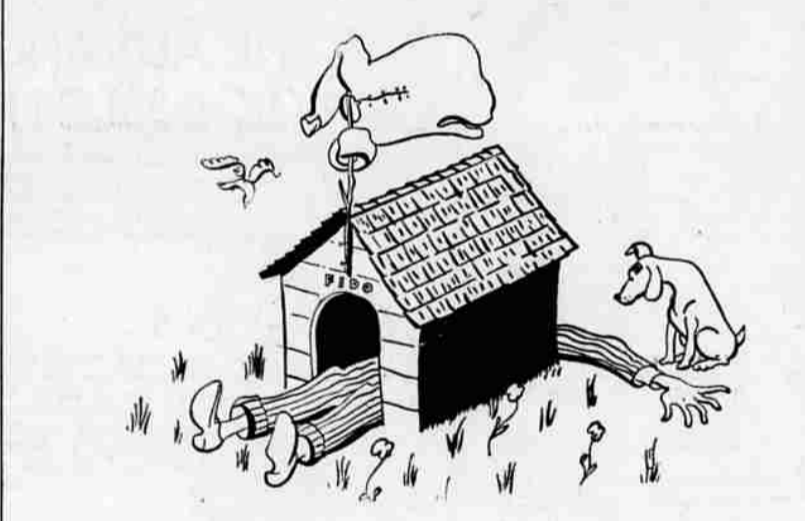
