

Grapplers Resume in Open Air Card at High School Field Tonight

TEAM WRESTLING WILL BE FEATURE IN SPORT REVIVAL

McDonald and Smolinski to Meet Kenaston and Kelly in New Style Action — Wilson, Pasha to Open

Promoter Mack Lillard's grappling troupe, absent from this community for the past month, fares forth with renewed fury tonight at the open-air high school stadium in the first under-the-stars program of the summer season. As usual, brawling starts at 8:30 sharp, and there will be no change in admission prices.

With 2400 fine seats available, 400 ringside and 2000 general admission, one of the largest wrestling crowds in recent years is expected to jam the stadium to witness the first team battle ever staged in southern Oregon.

It will be Soekyo Jack McDonald and Polish Palooka Joe Smolinski teaming together in a one-hour, four-out-of-six fall encounter with Sgt. Bob Kenaston, Gold Hill's pride and joy, and Flash Kelly, a clean and scientific wrestler from San Francisco. The two teams will seek each other around until one or the other obtains four tumbles, within the space of 60 minutes.

Rounding out the program, Benny Wilson of Texas and All Pasha of Hindustan clash in a six-round opening set. Toy Aho, popular Finnish referee, will attempt to keep things from going chaotic.

All six principals on tonight's de luxe attraction are in great shape for the open-air inaugural. McDonald, rugged ex-lagger from Seattle, has been training ardently for the past two weeks, and claims he is in the finest physical condition of his career. Kenaston, master of the devastating Gold Hill crab, has been wrestling in southern California for six months, and has Joe Smolinski, the villainous Pole, both are in tip-top fettle. Flash Kelly, making his first appearance here, is reputedly one of the best legitimate wrestlers in the game, and is a certain crowd-pleaser, Lillard says.

Although tonight's team battle will be the first ever held here, it is not a new wrestling innovation. For the past several years grapplers in Portland and other northwest cities have pooled their ability against two or three other grunts and grogners, with the result that fans have witnessed spectacular and dramatic action never seen in matches between single wrestlers.

Possibilities of rousing mat action are almost unlimited in bouts between two or three-man teams. For six months, when one team obtains a fall from the other, the fallen grappler must retire from the ring leaving his opponent to face the onslaught of the unweakened other duo. When one team secures two falls, the grapplers rest for three minutes, then come back intact to battle it out until four tumbles are registered.

MARATHONER WINDS UP IN EUREKA HOSPITAL; LACKS REST AND FOOD

EUREKA, Cal., July 25.—(UP)—Adam Ziegler's attempt to set a new marathon record from San Francisco to Grants Pass, Ore., ended here last night in a hospital.

The 56-year-old Austrian passed out from exhaustion north of Arcata in Humboldt county and was brought to a hospital here where attendants said he was suffering chiefly from lack of sleep and an improper diet.

Ziegler, who left San Francisco last Monday, hoped to break the 400-mile marathon record set in 1928 by an Indian, Flying Cloud.

With Ziegler unable to continue, Flying Cloud's record of 6 days, 25 hours and 4 minutes still stands.

Ziegler was ahead of Flying Cloud's time when he was forced to discontinue.

SEATTLE SHOOTER HANDICAP CHAMP

PORTLAND, Ore., July 25.—(AP)—A. L. Barnes, a scatter-gunner from Seattle, broke 98 out of 100 clay pigeons yesterday and won the grand handicap championship, closing event of the Pacific International Trapshooting association tournament.

CRATERS WALLOP ASHLAND, 26 TO 11 IN BATTING ORGY

Rickert Opens Offensive With Homer in First Inning—Ashland Weakened by Absence of Regulars

They are sadly rebuilding the fences in Ashland today, thankful that Medford's crashing Craters have made their final Southern Oregon league appearance of the season in that village.

Touched off by Manager Wally Rickert's soaring home run over the centerfield wall in the first inning with one aboard, the dynamite contained in Crater bats didn't stop exploding until all single-game offensive records for the year were busted. The score was 26 to 11, giving Medford its third straight second-half victory and a share of the league lead, and Ashland its third consecutive setback in this half and a corner of the cellar championship.

Unleashing the most vicious battering attack in two seasons, the Craters pounded Righthanders Phil Griggs and Arba Ager, Lithian pitchers, for 25 safe hits, including two home runs, a triple and five doubles. In addition to Rickert, Bob Smith belted a round-tripper in the fourth with nobody on, Tommy White blasted a 400-foot triple against the right-field boards in the ninth, Hooper Hafford hit two doubles and two singles in four trips for a perfect day, and Lewis, McLean and Hampel socked doubles.

Lewis got four hits, so did McLean, and White batted out a couple of singles to go with his triple. The Craters scored in every inning, but the ninth, their biggest coming in the third when six tallies pattered across. Hafford, out all Saturday night fighting fire, enjoyed his best batting day of the season.

Weakened by the absence of First Baseman Leonard Patterson, Shortstop Ted Schopf and Pitcher Alva Merritt, all of whom were on the fire-fighting lines, the Lithians never had a chance. They managed to belt Lowell Brown, Medford's starting hurler, for eight hits and six runs in the first six innings, and Bill Rathke for four safeties and five tallies in the last three frames, but they were not enough.

Ager Lithian Bat Star Arba Ager was the Lithians' big gun yesterday, rapping five straight hits in five chances, and Darrell Leavens clouted a homer in the seventh, with one on base, in addition to getting two one-basers.

Brown, in his six innings of mound toil for the Craters fanned six and gave up two passes. The Lithians solved him for two runs in the first on Baughman's single, a walk to Leavens and singles by Ager and Porterfield. They got three more in the fourth on a hit batsman, errors by Calvert and Smith, a walk and Ager's single, and tallied again in the sixth on Lewis' error and singles by Leavens and Ager.

Rathke, opening the seventh for the Craters, was promptly touched for five runs, Griggs' single, Leavens' homer to right-center and Ager's double, coupled with two more errors and a walk, doing the business.

Griggs was no mystery to the Craters. Following two runs in the first when Rickert lofted his homer, the Medford's came back with three more in the second on a single by Rickert, Lewis' double and singles by Hafford and White. Hafford's two-base hit and Lewis' single, added to three walks and two errors, accounted for six more markers in the third. Smith hit his homer in the fourth, and in the fifth four more runs were punched over on hits by Lewis, Hafford, White, McLean, Brown and Calvert.

Thirdbaseman Ager took over Ashland's pitching duties in the sixth.

EUGENE JUNIORS TAKE 2 OUT OF 3 IN SERIES HERE

Youngsters Battle Through 17 Innings for Right to Enter State American Legion Junior Playoffs

In six hours and 17 innings of baseball yesterday afternoon at the high school park, Eugene's American Legion junior baseball team earned the right to enter the state playoffs at Woodburn by defeating Medford's Legion juniors, two games out of three. The weary youngsters, starting the first game at 1:00 o'clock, battled through two five-inning encounters and one seven-inning affair, and finally stopped playing as darkness began to settle down at 7 p. m.

Eugene won the first game, 8 to 3. Medford came back to deadlock the series by grabbing the second encounter in two extra innings, 16 to 10, and Eugene won the "rubber" affair, 10 to 1.

Medford's Bob Newland gave up only five hits in the opener, and the locals solved Bobby Robertson's delivery for four safeties. Medford's three tallies were produced in the fourth inning on walks to Reed and Botts and Newland's triple. Newland scored after Schane fled out to centerfield.

Eugene scored twice in the first, once in the third, twice more in the fourth and once in the fifth.

A six-run rally in the seventh inning, breaking a 10-10 tie, gave Medford a win in the second encounter. Jimmy Lewis got the only hit of the inning as DeAutremont walked four batters and Eugene fielders committed two errors. Newland hit a homer in the fifth. Botts got five straight walks and Miller, Wray and Reed each collected two hits.

The third game was decided when Eugene scored six times in the third inning. Robertson, on the mound for the visitors again, gave up only three hits, by Wray, Newland and Reed, as his teammates belted five Medford pitchers for nine safeties. DeAutremont hit a homer.

CAPE HATTERAS WILL BE PARK

WASHINGTON—(UP) Desolate and lonely Cape Hatteras, one of the finest fishing grounds on the Atlantic coast, will become a national park on completion of extensive erosion control work, the interior department has revealed.

Along 17 1/2 miles of seacoast from the Virginia border south to Ocracoke inlet, the national park service is creating protective foredunes and dune ranges, fixing the sand by protective planting and reforestation.

Hatteras is a storm worn barrier spit between sound and ocean, from several miles to a few hundred feet in width. Along much of its length there are no roads. Its nearly primitive character makes it ideal for a national park, park service officials said.

Next firing on the smallbore range will take place August 7 in preparation for an inter-club night shoot at Yreka, Cal., under electric lights. Outdoor lighted ranges have proven quite a drawing card in the south, and the Yreka match will be the first one of its kind on the coast north of Sacramento.
