

### BAR ASSOCIATION BARS QUESTIONING BLACK ELIGIBILITY

#### Resolution to Ask Supreme Court On Justice's Status Is Voted Down, 67 to 17, Without Debate.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, July 28.—(AP)—The assembly of the American Bar Association today rejected 67 to 17 a resolution which would have asked the United States supreme court for information on the eligibility of Justice Hugo Black to sit on the court.

The resolution presented by Edward T. Lee, dean of the John Marshall law school, of Chicago, previously was refused approval by the resolutions committee.

Dean Lee took the floor in support of the resolution saying he did not introduce it "to obtain publicity as charged by friends of Justice Black."

"Sense of duty to the dignity of the high profession of which I am an inconspicuous member impelled me to offer this resolution," Lee said.

No one spoke against the resolution.

Also unfavorably reported to the convention's assembly was a proposed resolution sharply attacking Nazi Germany for "discrimination" against "law abiding citizens . . . solely because of their race, religion or political opinions which action has shocked the conscience of mankind."

"The matter is not within the purview of the association," the committee, headed by L. B. Day of Lincoln, Neb., said of the Germany resolution introduced by C. C. Burlington, New York City attorney.

In reporting on the Black resolution the committee pointed out the supreme court already had refused to rule on the Alabama eligibility in the proceeding brought by Albert Levitt, an attorney.

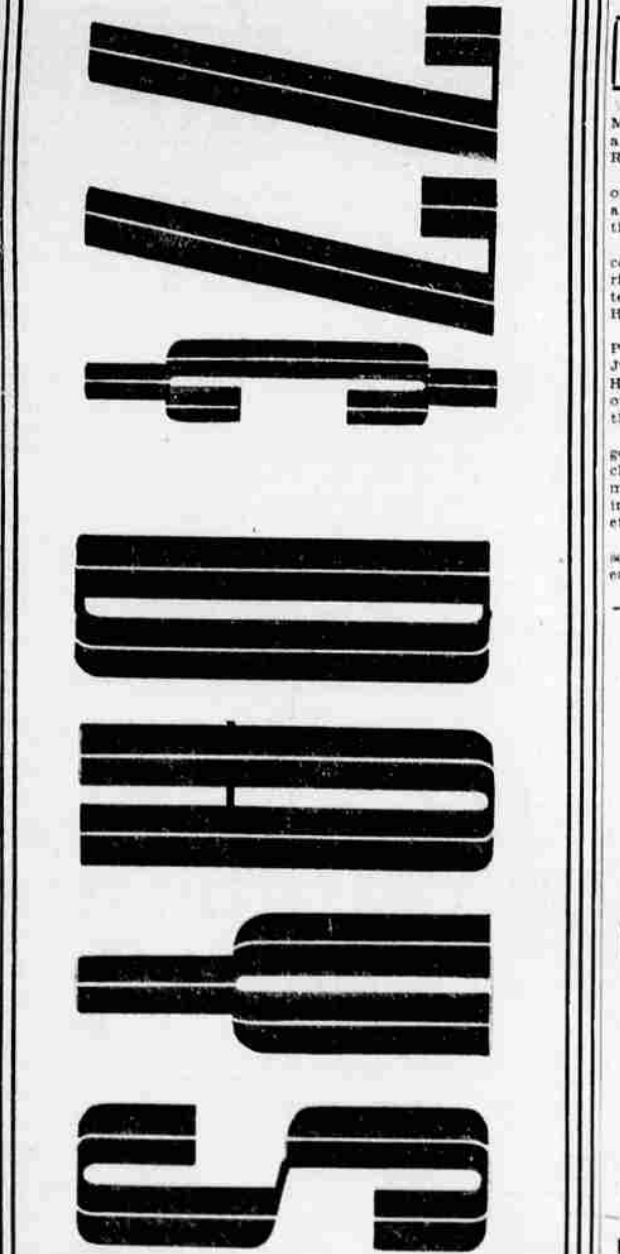

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### ORDER CIVILIANS TO QUIT HANKOW BEFORE AIR RAIDS

#### Japanese War Machine Moves Steadily Nearer Populous Tri-City Area—Huper Province Occupied

Quick evacuation of all civilians from Hankow, China's provincial capital, was ordered today as Japan's war machine moved steadily closer to the populous tri-city area.

In Spain, meanwhile, a surprise government counter-offensive in Catalonia apparently still was forging ahead in its fourth day.

The command civilians leave the three Yangtze river cities—Hankow, Wuchang and HanYang—showed Chinese fears for the area and their desire to avoid sacrificing non-combatants in expected Japanese air raids.

**Japs Enter Hupoh**

The Japanese today entered Hupoh province, the eleventh of the 24 Chinese provinces to be involved in the war, advancing from captured Kiang, 135 miles southeast of Hankow.

Spanish insurgent reports said fleets of General Franco's warplanes had blown up hastily-built pontoon bridges over which government forces had crossed the Ebro river for their drive on the 90-mile Catalan front. Insurgent plans to blast dams of the river and its tributaries to halt the offensive were reported.

Observers with the advancing government armies, however, said men and guns still were flowing across the Ebro to support advance units fighting their way into strategic Gandesa, which has been Franco's regional headquarters since April 2.

Three columns of government troops were said to have surrounded Gandesa except for the highway west of Alconete.

**Rebels Halted**

The sudden government attack appeared to have put such pressure on the insurgents that their other offensives—against Valencia, further south, and in Estremadura, in the far west—were halted, at least temporarily.

British Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain decided to delay his annual fishing trip in Scotland so he could meet Reichsmarschall Adolf Hitler's adjutant, Capt. Fritz Weidemann, to try to hasten his long-chastised British-German "understanding."

Viscount Runciman, newly-named British observer in the Czechoslovak dispute over the rights of Sudeten German and other minorities, will leave for Praha August 1.
