FISHING AT BEST IN CRATER LAKE

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Ore., July 29.—(Sp.)—A report from Superintendent E. P. Leavitt's office indicates that exceptionally good catches of rainbow trout and silver-side salmon have been made in Crater lake during the past week. The catches per hour per fisherman have been better during the past week than at any time during the summer.

On July 21 a party of two fished three hours, returning with five fish, three rainbows and two silver-sides. The smallest, a silver-side, tipped the scales at 1 3/4 pounds; the largest, a rainbow, weighed 7 1/2 pounds. On July 25 a party of four returned from six hours fishing with 26 fish ranging in weight from 2 to 5 1/2 pounds, the largest being a silver-side salmon. Other good catches have been reported during the week.

The best catches have been obtained by trolling with large flashers in fairly deep water near shore, using worms for bait.

Bowboats and tackle may be rented at the foot of the Lake trail. A greater number of boats are available than during any previous summer. No license is necessary to fish in Crater lake. The limit is 12 fish per day per person.

BAR BACKS U. S. BOMBING PROTEST

CLEVELAND, July 29.—(P)—The American Bar association's house of delegates adopted today a resolution approving the U. S. government's protests against bombing civilians in Spain and China.

The association also recorded its conviction the principle "that treaties must be observed" is a cardinal maxim of international law and that "the full and faithful observance of covenants among nations is essential to preservation of order, peace and law in international affairs."

Frank J. Hogan, Washington attorney, was elected president of the association to succeed Arthur T. Vanderbilt. Thomas B. Gray of Richmond, Va., was elected chairman of the house of delegates, administrative and policy-forming body of the association, to succeed George Maurice Morris of Washington. John H. Voorhees of Sioux Falls, S. D., was elected treasurer.
