

SUB-STRATO HOP SEEN FORETASTE REGULAR SERVICE

Nine Aviators and Scientist Make Leisurely Flight Using Newly Developed Oxygen Mask Device

LOS ANGELES, July 29.—(UP)—Nine aviators and a young scientist, looking like men from another planet, Thursday ended a 1900-mile leisurely sub-stratoplane journey which was regarded as a possible forerunner of all commercial flights of the near future.

Each man wore over his face a mask-like device through which he breathed a mixture of air and oxygen whenever the plane climbed three or four miles above the ground on the two-day run from Minneapolis.

Party Enthusiased
The plane, a regular Lockheed twin-motored transport of the Northwest Airlines fleet, landed at Union Air terminal after a flight from Salt Lake City where it stopped Wednesday night.

Every member of the party was enthusiastic over results of the first transcontinental flight with the new oxygen equipment recently developed by three scientists of the Mayo Foundation of Rochester, Minn. One of them, Dr. W. R. Lovelace, was aboard. "The masks worked satisfactorily throughout the trip," Lovelace said. "We flew as high as 20,000 feet and felt no more discomfort than if we had never left the ground."

Reactions Noted.
As the "flying oxygen tent" cruised through rarified air levels, Lovelace frequently examined his companions to detect their reactions. He found their respiration and heart action normal and a normal supply of carbon dioxide being exhaled from the lungs. At no time did fingers or lips turn blue, telltale signs of high altitude flying without proper oxygen. Headaches and ear-popping were absent. Crew members emphasized that breathing was as effortless as though their feet had never left the ground.

The mask, resembling a huge football nose-guard, fits tightly over the nose. Two tubes run along either side of the mouth, which is left free and appended under the chin is a rubber bladder through which the oxygen is fed from a tube connecting with a single tank. A valve on each mask can be regulated to control the flow of air with the oxygen supply adjusting itself automatically. Both inhaling and exhaling are done through the mask, which is made of gum rubber and weighs only six or seven ounces.

Lovelace, who was a naval flying cadet before he became a surgeon, said certain adjustments would be made before the device is turned over to a manufacturer for commercial output. He said this would take only two or three months.

The equipment was designed by Lovelace and Drs. Walter Boothby and Arthur Bullen, following a year's research and development.

Neighbors Discover Grim Farm Tragedy

Meatless Dinner Menu
(Serving three or four)
Corn Souffle Baked New Potatoes
Creamed Eggs
Blueberry Muffins Butter
Sliced Cucumbers
Fresh Fruit Medley
Sponge Cake
Coffee

Corn Souffle
3 tablespoons butter
4 tablespoons flour
1 1/2 cups milk
1 cup corn, cooked
1-3 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1/4 teaspoon celery salt
1 teaspoon minced parsley
3 egg yolks, beaten
3 tablespoons minced pimientos (optional)
2 egg whites, beaten
Melt the butter. Add the flour and when mixed, add the milk. Cook slowly and stir constantly until a thick sauce forms. Add the corn, seasonings and yolks. Beat for two minutes. Fold in the rest of the ingredients. Pour into a buttered baking pan (ring mold suggested) and bake for 35 minutes in a pan of hot water in a moderately slow oven. Let stand for five minutes in a warm place. Unmold carefully and surround with creamed vegetables, mushrooms or hard-cooked eggs.

Blueberry Muffins
3 cups pastry flour
6 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 egg yolks
1 1/4 cups milk
1 cup washed, drained blueberries
2 egg whites, beaten
3 tablespoons fat, melted
Mix together the flour, baking powder, sugar and salt. Add the yolks and milk. Beat for one minute. Fold in the rest of the ingredients and mix lightly. Half-fill greased muffin pans and bake for 20 minutes in a moderately slow oven. Serve warm, with butter.

Fresh Fruit Medley
2 cups sliced peaches
1 cup seeded cherries
1 cup sliced bananas
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1/4 cup granulated sugar
Mix and chill ingredients and serve in glass dishes. Garnish with fresh mint.

CLEARING SMOKE IN ROGUE FOREST LURES VISITORS

The following recreational bulletin was issued today by Rogue River national forest headquarters:
"With the clearing of the smoke which has been covering the entire forest for the last week, the possibility of heavy use of the forest by recreationists this week-end increases. Clear and cool weather is reported on all parts of the forest, with the probability of continuing fair. There are no restrictions or closures in the forest so far as recreational use is concerned, but fire hazard continues high and extreme caution is requested.
"At Lake O' Woods campgrounds last week-end there were approxi-

mately 1000 persons. McKee, Fish Lake, and Dead Indian Soda Springs camps were also heavily used. Between 30 and 40 persons were reported at Fourmile lake camp. The Applegate and Butte Falls camps were only lightly used.
"Good catches were made in the south fork of the Rogue river last week-end with flies and grasshoppers. Good catches of rainbow have been made at Steamboat on Carberry creek with flies. High up on the middle fork of the Applegate good bait fishing is reported. Elliott creek is not good and Big Applegate has given only fair catches with bait or flies. Fishing at Lake O' Woods continues fair with catches of perch and some bass. Fish lake is only fair, with two to five eastern brook being caught a day. Fourmile lake is good, with few near-limit catches of all-verse, rainbow and eastern brook taken either by trolling or still fishing. The south fork of Little Butte creek has given some catches, especially good above Dead Indian Soda springs campground. Very little fishing has been done at Sky lakes this past week.
"Men are falling trees on the right-of-way of the new road from

Lake O' Woods to Klamath Falls. Also, there is a crew working with a grader on the west side of Lake O' Woods road. A COC crew is working on the road past the new office at Lake O' Woods ranger station. Traffic over the Ashland peak loop drive has been very light, with the road in fairly good condition.
"One hundred girls of the Klamath 4-H club were hostesses to more than 80 parents and friends Wednesday at their summer camp at Lake O' Woods. The camp will end this week. The Campfire Girls left Lake O' Woods Wednesday and are to be replaced by the Girl Scouts of Klamath."
