

Ginger Rogers Stars with Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., In Craterian Show

MOUNTAIN RESORT SETTING FOR GAY VACATION ROMANCE

The exciting, romantic and laughable story of two young people who meet at a vacation camp. "Having a Wonderful Time," brings Ginger Rogers and Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., to the screen of the Craterian theatre today for a three-day run.

The film, adapted from the play that made such a hit on Broadway, has its principal setting at a mountain resort. Scores of working people from New York, pleasure-seeking youngsters, young and old married couples, elderly gossip, young college men working their way at the camp, are gathered in a variegated group, and against this informal background the main theme of the picture is presented.

Ginger Rogers is shown as the pretty stenographer, unwilling to wait any longer for her weak-kneed fiance to marry her, deciding to "shoot the works"—her term for a full-time—in one grand and glorious two weeks' vacation in the mountain resort.

Fairbanks is the ambitious but penniless young law student who has taken a job as waiter in the camp. A hectic romance springs up between the two—made even more hectic by the petty jealousies of a girl who constantly comes up—eventually finds the two young people facing the common problem of thousands of other young couples, the lack of money on which to marry. Their hope of solving the problem makes for strong dramatic element along with the sparkling comedy of the story.

Supporting the two principals are Peggy Conklin, as Ginger's girl friend at the camp; Richard Dix, as the camp's vaudeville star, as the camp's vice-cracking social director; Lee Bowman, Donald Meeck, Ann Miller, Dorothea Kent, Grady Sutton, Eve Arden, Wesley Barry and Russell Gleason.

HOTEL STRIKE IS TARGET OF SUIT

PORTLAND, Ore., July 30.—(AP)—The joint executive board of the Hotel and Restaurant Workers' union filed suit in circuit court yesterday against eight major Portland hotels. The unions have been on strike since early in June.

T. H. Magill, president, and Gertrude Sweet, secretary of the board, filed the action asking a circuit court decree forcing the hotels to "specifically perform the terms and conditions of agreements and to recognize the executive board and the various locals represented by it as the exclusive bargaining agencies for the hotel employees."

The unions charged the hotels refused to live up to unexpired agreements with the board and the unions.

PORTLAND CENTER FOR ART OFFERED

PORTLAND, July 30.—(AP)—An offer by Ralph B. Lloyd, Los Angeles capitalist, of two large tracts of land on the north and south sides of Holladay park was made today to a group seeking to create a \$400,000 art center consisting of a theater, art gallery, historical library and accommodations for art societies and the University of Oregon extension art department.

The group plans to seek a \$285,000 federal grant and raise a sponsors' fund of \$115,000, toward which Lloyd also offered a substantial contribution.

MONTHLY BUTTER SCORING MAPPED

SALEM, July 30.—(AP)—Members of the dairy manufacturers advisory committee met here today with representatives of the state department of agriculture and adopted a plan for monthly regulatory scorings for all butter produced in Oregon.

The scorings will begin sometime next month, and two teams will alternate in the work. One team is composed of Earl Cavett, and A. W. Hare, Portland, and Bryant Williams, state department of agriculture representative at McMinnville.

Members of the other team are John Bigler, Mt. Angel; Frank Mosler, Corvallis and O. G. Simpson, manager of the Portland milk and cream testing laboratory.

FIRE SITUATION IS MOST FAVORABLE IN THREE WEEKS

SALEM, July 30.—(AP)—The forest fire situation in Oregon was the most favorable today for three weeks, State Forester J. W. Ferguson declared.

Ferguson said the Nehalem fire which burned over 1000 acres was under control and that a large number of men had been withdrawn from the Valselt and Smith river fires. He reported the Douglas county situation much improved.

Yesterday's reports indicated that 19 fires had been started by lightning in Douglas county but none of these was serious. Several small buildings were destroyed there, he said.

In event conditions continue to improve, Ferguson said he would be able to withdraw a number of closure orders within the next few days.

The state forester reported recent rains south of Eugene and in the Cascade mountain area. He said heavy fogs had prevented serious fires along the coast.

The most disastrous fire under the jurisdiction of the state forester was in the Smith river district, northern Douglas county. This fire burned over 9000 acres and destroyed considerable merchantable timber.

Ferguson said not more than 30 fires were raging on lands under his jurisdiction at the present time.

There were more than 200 fires 10 days ago.

WILD LIFE BODY WILL SAVE DUCKS

WASHINGTON, July 30.—(AP)—Federal and state wildlife conservationists plan to utilize information gained by research and observation in Utah and Oregon in a campaign against a disease which has decimated flocks of ducks in western waterfowl refuges.

Dr. J. E. Shillinger of the bureau of biological survey, said today much of the bureau's knowledge of how to check the disease, a form of botulism usually referred to as western duck sickness, had been obtained from practice of preventive methods in the Bear river area of Utah and from pioneering research at Tule Lake, near Klamath Falls, Ore.
