While the volume was larger than that of yesterday—transfers approximated 800,000 shares—the comparative meagerness of the turnover in relation to the wide distribution of advances was a little discouraging to recovery proponents.

25 CENT DIVIDEND FOR G.M. COMMON HOLDERS

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Directors of General Motors Corp. today declared a dividend of 25 cents a share on the common stock, duplicating payments in the previous two quarters.

At the same time the usual preferred dividend of \$1.25 a share was ordered.

Last week the company reported earnings for the quarter to June 30 equivalent to 52 cents a common share, compared with \$1.48 a share in the same quarter last year.

The common dividend is payable Sept. 12 to holders of record Aug. 11 said preferred Nov. 1 to holders of record Oct. 10.
