SLAYER CAPTURED AFTER GUN FIGHT
EUREKA, Calif., Aug. 2. - (UP) - A pistol fight with state and city officers in Eureka's main streets ended with the capture of Everett Gilbert Parman, 28, Roseville, Calif.

Parman had since July 16 on murder charges as a result of the slaying of George McElroy, 20, Placer Junior college athlete.

McElroy was shot down on a Riverside street by a man he had taken to task for making unwanted advances toward Margaret Brusco, 21, McElroy's sister-in-law. McElroy's wife, Ruth, 18, told officers Parman was the man with whom McElroy had clashed and Chief of Police Russell Carter of Roseville swore to a murder complaint against Parman.

State highway patrolmen, testing automobiles for defective headlights, chanced upon Parman last night.

Parman has an uncle and other relatives in the Astland district. A watch was kept by local authorities on this section. Parman might return to this section.
