

ITALY LAUNCHED ON STREAMLINING OF RAIL SYSTEMS

Goal of 4-Year Project Is More Comfort and Speed — Will Electrify Lines for World Fair in 1942

ROME—(UP)—Thousands of workmen have started what is to be a bustling, uninterrupted four-year undertaking to improve Fascist Italy's railways.

These strong-muscled laborers are scattered from the northern frontier to the tip of the peninsula.

During the next four years it will be their task to build new stations, lay down lines where none presently exist, double sections of track which now have only single lines, eliminate grade crossings, electrify stretches now covered by steam lines and build bridges and bore tunnels to shorten rail distances.

Others in factories will construct new high-speed electric locomotives, aerodynamic coaches and additional first, second and third-class coaches for the ever increasing traffic.

The object of all this feverish activity is to make traveling safer and more comfortable, bring railways to points not served, improve the service to other centers and shorten the rail time between ports and frontier towns to Rome in time for the 1942 world fair.

Deadline Set in 1942
Fascists predict that every item on the bill will be completed, even to the last bolt, by April 21, 1942, when the Rome fair is to be inaugurated.

One of the most important single items on the program is the construction of the new \$8,000,000 electric underground railway to join Rome and the world fair, which will be on the outskirts of the capital.

The underground section will run from Rome's central railway station, down the Via Cavour to the colosseum, thence to Maximus Circus and along the new Viale Africa to St. Paul's Gate. Here it will come to the surface and for some distance use the tracks of the existing Rome-Ostia line. It will branch off at Tr. Fontane where the fair grounds are located.

The railway will be seven miles long. It will have two lines of tracks and the power will be supplied by overhead cables. Each train will have six coaches equipped with automatic closing doors. There will be three stations in Rome—the Terminal, Santa Maria Maggiore and the Colosseum.

To Get New Station
The next item on the works program is the construction of a new central railway station for Rome. The one now in use is too small to handle the traffic and outmoded for the importance that Rome has assumed.

The number of tracks running into Rome will be increased, the roadbeds improved and the signaling system modernized.

The third item, and one affecting the northern part of the country, was announced by Stefano Benni, minister of communications, in a speech at Genoa on June 11.

It will cost the government \$84,000,000 and serve to increase the importance of Genoa as a northern railway and ship terminus.

Benni's Genoa announcement was the expected epilogue to Premier Benito Mussolini's visit to that city late in May.

The process of electrifying all of Italy's lines will be pursued without letup. The section between Pisa and Rome, which is the incomplete electric link between Rome and the northern frontier, will be affected. Foreign travelers will be able to travel by electric train direct to Rome without branching off through Florence.

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Human Guinea Pig of 1900 Tells of Yellow Fever Terror

ROCHESTER, Minn. (UP)—Only one man is alive today who went through the entire experiment by Dr. Walter Reed in Cuba in 1900 to determine the method of transmission of yellow fever.

He is John R. Kinsinger, Huntington, Ind., who told members and guests of the Mayo Foundation chapter of Sigma Xi of his experience during the experiment which determined mosquito bites spread the fever.

"I am the only man alive today who has been through the whole experiment by Dr. Reed and his co-workers in Cuba," Kinsinger said. "John J. Moran is alive, but he was in the second theory of the experiment."

He told Dr. Reed's offer to pay volunteers \$100 if they failed to get the disease, and \$200 if they did. He and Moran volunteered to be bitten on condition they receive no financial reward.

Of him and Moran, Major Reed wrote that "this exhibition of moral courage has never been surpassed in the annals of the army of the United States."

Kinsinger received a congressional medal of honor for his part in the experiment, the Coolidge citation in 1929, and his name has appeared annually in Cuba in 1900 to determine the method of transmission of yellow fever.

MISSOURIANS GIVE SEN. CLARK HEAVY NOMINATION VOTE

The only other Virginia house race was much closer. Rep. Norman Hamilton, calling himself pro-Roosevelt despite his vote against the government reorganization bill, lost by about 1,500 votes to former Rep. Colgate Darden, whom he had unseated in 1936. Hamilton said Darden was backed by Sen. Harry Byrd's organization.

Kansas For Reed
In yesterday's Republican primary, greatest interest was shown in the Kansas senatorial race because of campaign charges that one of the four candidates—the Rev. Gerald Winrod—was pro-Nazi. Winrod, who denied the accusation, ran third.

The nomination went to former Gov. Clyde Reed. The count in half the state gave him 22,000 more votes than Dallas Knapp, running second, and 24,000 more than Winrod. The Rev. J. C. Fisher trailed. Gov. Walter Huxman, Democrat,

was renominated without opposition. State Senator Payne Ratner, who like Reed lives in Parsons, Kas., was ahead for the Republican gubernatorial nomination.

Winner of the Republican senatorial contest in Missouri was former Gov. Henry S. Caulfield, who easily defeated politically unknown Ray E. White, St. Louis real estate man. Senator Clark polled three and a half times as many votes in the first half of the state to report as did his three opponents combined. Joseph T. Davis, Willis H. Meredith, and Robert I. Young.

Pendergast Man Loses
Missouri Democrats, who had taken Clark's victory for granted, were more interested in a fight for a state supreme court nomination between forces of Gov. Lloyd C. Stark and T. J. Pendergast, Kansas City party leader.

James V. Billings, endorsed by Pendergast, took an early lead because Kansas City's precincts were counted early, but Judge James M. Douglas gradually pulled ahead as returns came in from St. Louis, his home town.

Yesterday's primaries formed a sort of curtain-raiser for two fiercely fought contests to be settled later this week. Tennessee Democrats will pick their senatorial and gubernatorial favorites tomorrow, and Kentucky Democrats will choose Saturday between Senator Alben W. Barkley and his challenger, Gov. A. B. Chandler.
