EUGENEAN DROWNS WHILE SWIMMING

EUGENE, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Jesse Elmer Rogers, 28, of Eugene, was drowned late last night while swimming in the coast fork of the Willamette river several miles south of here, the coroner's office revealed today.

Rogers had gone to the river with a party of friends, and had been in swimming for about 10 minutes before the drowning occurred. Friends stated he was not a good swimmer, and it was believed he ventured into water which was too swift. The drowning occurred shortly after 10:30 o'clock, and the body was not recovered for almost an hour. Attempts at artificial resuscitation proved futile.
