TRY TURTLE CAR ON SALT FLATS

BONNEVILLE SALT FLATS, Utah, Aug. 8.—(AP)—A turtle-shaped race car flashed over this lake bed today at 250 miles an hour.

Using only a three-mile strip of salt for a quick get-away, John Cobb, London fur broker, served notice on the speed world his new creation is a serious contender for the world's land speed record.

Towing his four-wheel drive, 3,800 pound car to this vast track shortly after dawn, Cobb, sitting in the chassis, drove several miles, watching various gadgets being used on a high speed car for the first time.

Then his mechanics installed the hull, barely four feet high and seven feet wide.

Cobb hopes to shatter Capt. George E. T. Epton's measured mile record of 311.42 M.P.H.

BREMERTON, Aug. 8.—(AP)—A man identified by sheriff's deputies as Robert C. Guiver, 66, carpenter, was found dead on a side road 9 miles west of here today, after he had alighted from his automobile, set down on a box of dynamite and detonated the explosive.

In his automobile, which contained his tools, officers found a note leaving his belongings to a son, Ralph, Bremerton high school teacher.

ESTACADA, Aug. 8.—(AP)—Western nudists, in convention at Camp Hesperia near here Saturday, passed a resolution opposing a nudist show of concession at the San Francisco fair next year and deplored exhibitions such as that at the San Diego fair.

The cuticle cultists also formed the western sun bathing conference and elected a California sunbather president, a Washington Beaver vice-president and an Oregon Hesperian, a woman, secretary.

CARROLL JURY TO VIEW CRIME SITE

SOUTH PARIS, Me., Aug. 8.—(AP)—Superior Court Judge William H. Fisher cut short today's session of Francis M. Carroll's trial for the murder of Dr. James G. Littlefield by permit two inspection trips by the jury.

First the 12 men viewed the Turkey Hill field, a mile from the courthouse where Paul N. Dwyer, who went to prison for the strangulation, claimed Carroll slew Mrs. Lydia Littlefield, 63.

Then, court was recessed until tomorrow and the jury, traveling by bus, went to New Gloucester to see the place where Dwyer previously had confessed killing Mrs. Littlefield.

He now accuses Carroll of both crimes.

DEAN OF OSC WARNS DAIRY ASSOCIATION

PORTLAND, Aug. 8.—(AP)—Dean William A. Schoenfeld, of the state college school of agriculture, told an estimated crowd of 3000 attending the seventh annual picnic of the Dairy Cooperative association Sunday not to "let anyone talk you into scuttling the milk control act or you'll lose whatever progress you have made."

"The individual would be hopelessly lost in the welter of business if he did not belong to a cooperative," the dean also declared.

Will W. Henry, manager of the association, said that since 1934 butter production by the cooperatives has increased from 322,000 to an estimated 2,800,000 pounds for 1938.
