

### CHILD GUIDANCE CLINIC PROVIDED JACKSON COUNTY

#### Aid for All Children Between Ages of 6 and 14 in Learning Or Behaviour Problems Is Objective

Beginning in September, the child guidance clinic as provided for by the Oregon state legislature, will be available to children of Jackson county, C. R. Bowman, superintendent of Jackson county schools, announced yesterday.

The clinic is financed by state funds and is conducted by the staff of the Oregon State university medical school, Allen Easton is the director.

As rapidly as organization can be effected, all parts of the state will have this service, which is free.

The general purpose of the clinic is to help all children between the ages of six and 14, who are either learning or behavior problems. It should not be confused with similar state clinic services which are also being given and which are restricted to help physically handicapped and tubercular children, and to check auditory, visual and dental defects.

At Parents' Request. Two or three clinics in each organized group will be held yearly and up to 20 children, including those being presented for recheck, will be seen at each one of these.

Two psychiatrists who are also physicians, together with nurses and clerical attendants, will conduct these clinics, and only those children will be entered whose parents are both desirous and willing to have the advantage of this service. Children will be referred for this service by private doctors, health workers, teachers and nurses, after a proper check has been made on the case.

Records and general office work of the clinic will center in the office of the county health physician, Dr. A. E. Merkel, located in the health department rooms in the courthouse.

The benefits and results of work of this type are so definitely established that all the educational authorities as well as those interested in the health and social conditions of our county welcome the inauguration of this work on the basis of a definite function and responsibility of our state. Mr. Bowman stated.

Jackson county for several years past has, through the efforts of the Public Health association and the County Medical association, held clinics of this nature, made possible by the very generous attitude of Dr. Henry Dixon and Dr. Richard R. Dillehunt of Portland, who have given their time and services free. The facilities of the Alex Sparrow Memorial clinic, together with the availability of county nurses and doctors serving in public health work here, give to Jackson county an unusually fine opportunity to conduct these clinics under the most favorable conditions.

#### Purpose Outlined.

In order that the public generally may understand the ultimate purpose of the work that the state guidance clinic is attempting, the following statement was given by Mr. Bowman. "Time was when a school pupil who failed to learn was simply accepted as more or less hopeless, either as respects all school work or some particular phase such as reading. Time was when a pupil who was a behavior problem either in his adjustment to the school or the home, or to society generally, was considered bad and accepted as more or less hopeless.

"Modern treatment of these problems is quite analogous to the method followed by the modern physician, and generally follows a definite procedure. The patient is checked for symptoms, these indicate or lead to the discovery of causes, and causes give clues to definite treatment. The guidance clinic follows broadly such procedure because it is now established that a non-learner is a non-learner for one or more of a group of generally understood reasons, and

likewise a behavior problem is such because of one or more of a number of causes quite generally understood. Many Causes. "No branch of modern science is barred from supplying the reasons and causes found ranging all the way from social maladjustments, the effects of which are best understood by the psychiatrist, to visual, hearing and other physical defects test understood and many times first detected by the physician. Extraneous and more or less contributory conditions are also checked by visiting nurses and by teachers. All forces, defects, influence and conditions are noted and assembled and these, together with the results of the modern psycho-metric tests used in all our best schools, make an intelligent background for clinic workers.

"As in the case of the doctor who has made a thorough diagnosis and who prescribes the treatment, so the clinic worker also prescribes a treatment which varies all the way from special teaching techniques to readjustment of environments and to medical treatment.

Value Understood. "Jackson county knows the value of these clinics and already has on file the records of many young people who have been taken permanently out of the realm of apparent hopelessness."

The Jackson county committee is composed of Dr. Gordon McCracken, president of the Jackson County Medical association; C. R. Bowman, superintendent of county schools; Eugene Thurston, Jackson county board of health; Dr. A. E. Merkel, Jackson county health officer; George A. Carlton, president of the Jackson County Public Health association; Mrs. J. C. S. Wells, representing the same organization; and E. H. Hendrick, superintendent of Medford schools.

Judge Day was named chairman of the committee Mrs. Wells, vice-chairman, and Miss Josephine Koppes, secretary.

Dr. Merkel will act as director of the local clinic and educational advisors, qualified to give psycho-metric tests, are: Loren Macgregor of the Southern Oregon Normal school; Mrs. Una B. Inch, supervisor of county school, and Miss Louise Basford, supervisor of Medford schools. Nurses who will make investigations for appointments are: Blanche Frible, Helen Parrish, Florence Weyer, Elizabeth McCalliard and Mary Ellen Bell of the Jackson County Health department; Mrs. Berrin Denton, Ashland school nurse; Miss Helen Goff, SONS nurse; Olive Curry, Medford school nurse; Miss Lillian Roberts and Mrs. Blanche Lyman.

Remedial and clinic teachers for any clinic work to be done in this county are Miss Gertrude Watzling and Mrs. Lizzie Merritt of Medford and Ashland, respectively.

### GROWERS OF CORN WILL SELL CROPS FREE OF CONTROL

#### Official Forecast of 1938 Yield Comes Under Line set for Referendum On Application of Quotas

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—(AP)—The agriculture department announced today an official forecast of a 2,566,221,000-bushel corn crop made unnecessary a farmer referendum on the application of marketing quotas.

As a result, corn growers will be free to sell or feed all the grain they produce this year. Under quotas, if two-thirds of the growers voting had approved, they would have been required to store their share of the surplus or pay a penalty tax of 15 cents a bushel.

The department said this year's indicated supply, taking into account an estimated surplus of 320,000,000 bushels from last year, was 2,886,000,000 bushels, or 27,000,000 bushels below the supply requiring a referendum.

The department estimated the combined winter and spring wheat crops at 99,989,000 bushels.

A month ago the department forecast 2,482,102,000 bushels of corn and 967,412,000 bushels of wheat for this year.

Corn production was 873,993,000 bushels last year, and 752,891,000 average during the ten years.

Winter wheat production is 688,458,000 bushels this year, according to the department's preliminary estimate. A month ago 715,425,000 bushels were indicated. Production was 685,102,000 bushels last year. The ten-year average was 546,396,000.

Spring wheat production is indicated as 267,531,000 bushels, compared with 251,987,000 a month ago and 188,801,000 last year, and 206,394,000 the ten-year average.

The Durum wheat crop, included in spring wheat, is indicated as 41,148,000 bushels, compared with 33,376,000 a month ago, 27,701,000 last year, and 40,084,000 the ten-year average.

Indicated production of oats is 1,041,009,000 bushels, compared with 1,099,829,000 a month ago, 1,146,258,000 last year, and 1,042,461,000, the ten-year average.

Indicated production of other crops with comparative figures for a month ago and last year:
