## RAIN POSTPONES LIGHTWEIGHT GO TO WEDNESDAY

 NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Henry Armstrong finally has been stopped, but it took a good, soaking rain to do it.

He and Lou Ambers were all ready to climb into the ring for their lightweight title scrap last night at the Polo grounds when a drizzle turned into a downpour and Promoter Mike Jacobs declared a week's armistice.

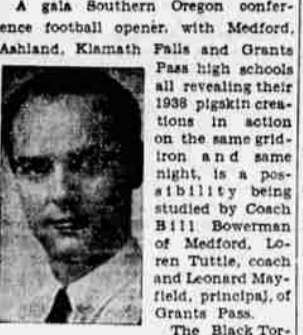
Taking no chances on another rebuff from the weather, Mike transferred the bout indoors to Madison Square Garden, where the pair will meet next Wednesday night. This was the fight's second postponement, it having been set up from the original date of June 26 when Ambers returned from the west coast with an injury.

The transfer to the Garden pleased Armstrong right down to the ground. Both the little negro and his portly manager, Eddie Mead, wanted the fight there all along, but the lightweight king insisted upon an outdoor setting, figuring it would require at least a ball park to hold the crowd.

 Southern Oregon Football Festival Talked for Opener



A gala Southern Oregon conference football opener, with Medford, Ashland, Klamath Falls and Grants all revealing their 1938 pickup creations in action on the same gridiron and same night, is a possibility being studied by Coach Bill Bowerman of Medford, Loren Tuttle, coach of Ashland, and Leonard Mayfield, principal of Grants, Pa.

The Black Tornado mentor said the idea was suggested recently by the two Grants Pass men, and that only Ashland and Klamath Falls OK'd to the proposition were needed to make it materialize. Coach Skeet O'Connell and Principal B. C. Forsythe of Ashland and Coach Snowy Gustafson of Klamath Falls will be contacted immediately, Bowerman said, and if they look kindly upon the idea definite plans will be formulated.

Because of the centralized location of Medford in the southern Oregon loop, the vast seating capacity of its stadium and the fine turf grounds, Coach Tuttle and Principal Mayfield suggested to Bowerman that the football festival be staged here. Of course, that is fine so far as Bill is concerned.
