HAMLET WILL END SHAKESPEARE FETE TOMORROW NIGHT

Famed Tragedy to Bring Festival to Close — 'Shrew' On Tonight — 'Merchant' Seen by Biggest Audience

With only two shows remaining in this year's Oregon Shakespearean Festival, the management today anticipated a substantial demand for tickets to the final productions from theater-goers who have not yet been able to attend any of the plays.

The Taming of the Shrew, one of Shakespeare's most sparkling comedies, will be given tonight and tomorrow night the fourth annual festival will be brought to a close with Hamlet, one of the outstanding tragedies of all time.

It was expected that the closing play would be seen by one of the largest audiences of this year's series. Added to the repertoire for the first time this year, Hamlet has proved one of the most popular plays ever given in the annual festivals and although it has already been staged twice this season interest has not waned and the advance ticket sale for tomorrow night indicates a near-capacity house.

Tickets For Students
 The management emphasized today that tickets for both tonight and tomorrow night are available at special low prices for high school and college students. It was pointed out that while the festival is concerned primarily with entertainment, Shakespearean plays are of educational value to students.

The largest audience of the series to date saw last night's repeat performance of the Merchant of Venice. The same professional touch that has characterized all the plays was again in evidence.

Playing Shylock, Angus L. Bowmer,

festival director, gave the role a convincing interpretation, arousing acclamations for the scheming money-lender, yet creating with an undertone of sympathy for the persecuted race the character symbolized. Old as the play is, the current treatment of Jews in Germany and Italy gives it a timely interest and emphasizes anew the immortality of Shakespeare's dramas.

Dramatic Portia
 The tense trial scene brought a hush over the audience as Grace Forsyth, playing Portia, rose to dramatic heights as she pleaded for mercy for the condemned Antonio and, falling in that, ordered Shylock to take his pound of flesh but not to shed a drop of blood. The range of Miss Forsyth's talents was displayed again when, after the dramatic trial scene, she turned to light comedy in bantering with Bassanio, her husband, who had not recognized her in man's attire. Miss Forsyth has been one of the most talented players ever engaged for the festival productions.

In the role of Bassanio, Angus Moore was a romantic suitor and sympathetic friend of Antonio. Hagen Moore made a satisfactory if a trifle stiff Antonio.

Doreen Leverette brought loveliness and understanding as well as a pleasant touch of light comedy to the role of Nerissa, maid-in-waiting to Portia. She made a good team-mate for Miss Forsyth, particularly in the plays lighter moments. Ann Kos was appealing as Jessica, Shylock's daughter.

Comedians Score
 Robert Stedman again filled an important role with complete satisfaction, bringing to the character of Gratiano the proper devil-may-care attitude. Gordon Davis, one of the most promising of the young actors, was a faithful Salario, friend of Antonio and Bassanio. William Cottrell and James Baughman again displayed their rare talent as comedians, getting all the fun there was from the roles of Launcelot, the clown, and Gobbo, his father.
