

Wallace Beery In "Port Of Seven Seas" Opens Craterian Run Today

MARCH OF TIME ON SCREEN WITH DRAMA OF U. S. COAST GUARD

A screen program entirely nautical opens a three day run today at the Craterian theatre. Starring Wallace Beery, "Port of Seven Seas" holds the featured spot, with a new March of Time, dealing with the U. S. coast guard, as a special added attraction.

Reminiscent of the part he played with Marie Dressler in "Min and Bill," Beery is shown as a rough but tender-hearted owner of a waterfront cafe in "Port of Seven Seas."

In the supporting cast are Maureen O'Sullivan, Frank Morgan, John Beal, Jessie Ralph and Cora Witherspoon. It tells the story of a boy and a girl, deeply in love but torn apart when the boy is no longer able to restrain his longing to sail away to the faraway places he has always dreamed about. RANGE STOCK IN STATE FAVORABLE

PORTLAND, Aug. 13.—(AP)—A mid-summer report on Oregon range conditions by the U. S. department of agriculture showed today that despite 10 days of extremely high temperatures in July, cattle continued to make good gains.

High mountain ranges were in very good condition but west of the Cascade mountains, pastures and ranges were poor by contrast, dried by a lack of rain since May 1. Cattle marketing probably will be delayed to utilize surplus hay and grain crops, the report said.

Lambs showed more improvement up to July 1 than last year but high July temperatures dried ranges rapidly and the department said a larger proportion of feeder lambs was expected earlier.

OAKLAND GHOULS INVADE CEMETERY

OAKLAND, Cal., Aug. 13.—(AP)—A scene of destruction greeted caretakers today at Mountain View cemetery—largest in the East bay—as a result of vandalism which Cemetery Superintendent F. B. Cullom estimated would cost from \$20,000 to \$25,000 to repair.

Eighty-three stones were uprooted or knocked over. Some were chipped badly. A vault also was entered and the handle of a crypt torn off. Several pieces of valuable jewelry were broken.

Police Inspectors James Montgomery and Jesse Jackson said three empty whisky bottles and the prints of three pairs of shoes comprised major clues.

FILIPINOS STAGE BIG CELEBRATION

MANILA, Aug. 13.—(AP)—Filipinos celebrated the 40th anniversary of American occupation of the Philippines today with what some officials termed the greatest public demonstration in the history of the islands, now going through a transition period preceding independence.

A vast throng estimated by observers to contain 100,000 Filipinos, equal to one-third of Manila's population, watched a huge parade that required three and one-half hours to pass, and heard an address by commonwealth President Manuel Quezon.

IDAHO DEMOCRATS EASED BY FARLEY

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 13.—(AP)—An ovation by National Democratic Chairman James A. Farley to conservative D. Worth Clark appeared today to have closed a threatened rift between Idaho Democrats.

Clark, who defeated one of the administration's supporters, Sen. James P. Pope, in Tuesday's Idaho Democratic senatorial primary, was offered backing of the national committee by Farley last night.

Rumors that Pope would run as a write-in candidate in the November general election were less frequent today after it was revealed Farley, vacationing in Michigan, wired Clark: "This is the first chance I have had to extend my heartfelt congratulations. If I personally or the Democratic national committee can be of assistance, please feel free to command me. You have my very best wishes for your success."

Farley, en route through Idaho prior to the primary, indicated the administration favored Pope's renomination. Clark campaigned that he was not an administration "yes-man."
