DREDGE TO WORK POORMAN CREEK

The Glide Foundation of California, H. B. Fields manager, has started work on construction of a dry land dredge on Poorman's creek in the Jacksonville district. As the land is dredged the earth will be replaced and present plans call for establishment of a cattle ranch. Five thousand acres of land have been purchased by the foundation. Expensive testing of the land has been made over the past year.

A number of cottages and other buildings have been constructed close to the Rich-Jacksonville highway. "Bulldozer" tractors have been busy the past 10 days removing the top soil preparatory to operations. All mechanical equipment installed is new.

Actual dredging operations are scheduled to start soon.
