NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—(AP)—Led by motors and steel, the stock market put on a slow-motion rally today that pushed up leaders fractions to 3 points before profit selling cut gains by a third or more at the close.

The list exhibited little appetite for a forward tilt at the start, but bidders stepped up on the second hour and selected issues were given a brief run to their best levels of the day. The pace quickened a trifle on the advance, but soon slowed to a crawl and transfers approximated only 650,000 shares.
