HOFFARD ELECTED CRATER MANAGER TO FINISH SEASON

Popular Veteran Confident Locals Will Win Second Half Championship—Practice Sessions Called.

Paul "Hoosier" Hoffard, the most popular baseball player to perform on a local diamond in the past 10 years, was last night unanimously chosen by members of the Medford Craters to lead them in the two remaining games of the second-half Southern Oregon league pennant race. The meeting was held in the offices of Austin Frazier, president of the Medford Athletic association, and was called to name a successor to Wally Rickett, who resigned his managerial job following the 13 to 10 Crater victory at Yreka Sunday.

There wasn't any doubt in the minds of Crater players last night regarding the man they wanted to manage the team for the balance of the year. Frazier, conducting the meeting, explained its purpose and asked them who they wanted. To a man, they answered, "Pop!" take us in."

New Chief Confident The big, left-handed hitting outfielder, in accepting the management, came out flatly with the statement that Medford should win the second-half championship. The first thing he did was call practice sessions for this afternoon, Wednesday and Friday at the high school park at 5:30.

With the resignation of Rickett from the management and from the team to devote all his time to business, a change in the Crater infield will be necessary. The new manager said that Orval Hempel, third baseman, would probably be shifted to first base, taking the place of Bob Smith, who won't see action again this season because of a growth on his ankle that needs rest before football season. Smith, however, will remain in the role of coach. Either Billy Calvert or Chief McLean will hold down second base, depending upon who pitches, and either of those two will catch, also depending upon the hurler. Dick Lewis will remain on short and Dick Sakrada, Hoffard and Tommy White in the outfield.

Cook On Third Biney Cook, ex-Linfield college star and new Phoenix high athletic coach, will hold down third base next Sunday here against Glendale. Cook, a right-handed batter, was placed on the local roster August 10, so will be eligible to play Sunday. Billy Piche, outfielder and Ray Erickson, pitcher, have been recalled from the junior Craters and will be in uniform Sunday.

Following next Sunday's game, the second-half will end with Crescent City playing here August 28.
