Army Posts Open—Recent war department regulations provide for the examination of applicants for commission in the medical administrative corps of the regular United States army. The examinations will be held November 14 to 18 and applications must be on file not later than October 29. Applications and requests for information should be addressed to the Adjutant General, Washington, D. C.

Air Travel Gains—Revenue passenger miles chalked up by United Air Line planes on their flights between Medford, Vancouver, California points and the east totaled 11,003,488 in July, a gain of 1 1/2 per cent over June when 10,838,795 revenue passenger miles were flown, according to figures received by Max C. Herne, field manager for the company here. Summer vacation travel and new low air fares, including half-fares for children, accounted for a portion of the traffic gain. It was stated by W. A. Patterson, United's president. An increase of 2.82 per cent in volume of air express shipments flown over United's Pacific coast and coast-to-coast airways was revealed in the month's record, with 164,084 pounds having been transported in July as compared to 159,992 pounds in June.

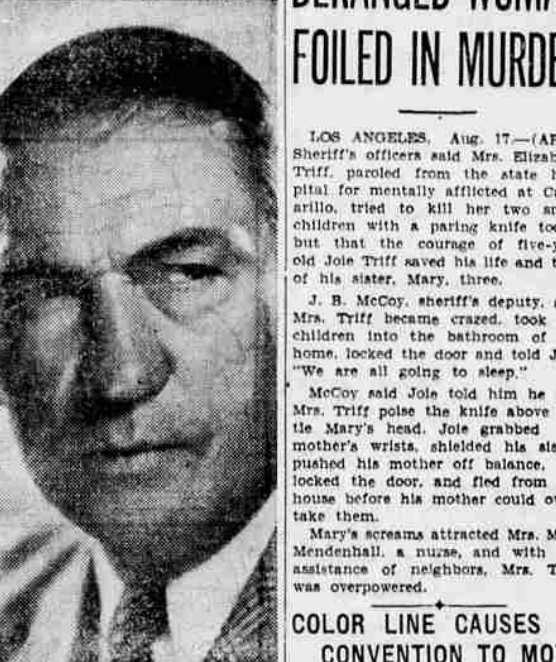

TOWNSEND SEES DOOM 'HAM AND EGG' PLAN

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 17.—(UP)—Dr. Francis E. Townsend, sponsor of the \$200 monthly old age pension plan, was represented today as believing California's new "30 every Thursday plan" was foredoomed to failure because it affected only one state. Townsend refused to be quoted directly but Glen S. Wilson, his spokesman, said "the doctor feels that any pension plan designed to bring about national recovery should be nationwide in scope."

The new plan, called "ham and eggs for California," proposed to raise the estimated \$1,500,000 weekly by issuing state warrants which would be financed by a two-cent transactions tax paid weekly by the person holding the \$1 warrant.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 17.—(AP)—Sheriff's officers said Mrs. Elizabeth Triff, paroled from the state hospital for mentally afflicted at Camarillo, tried to kill her two small children with a paring knife today but that the courage of five-year old Joie Triff saved his life and that of his sister, Mary, three. J. B. McCoy, sheriff's deputy, said Mrs. Triff became crazed, took the children into the bathroom of her home, locked the door and told Joie, "We are all going to sleep."

COLOR LINE CAUSES CONVENTION TO MOVE

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 17.—(UP)—Eight hundred delegates to the 29th annual convention of the Hotel, Restaurant and Bartenders International alliance today moved their convention headquarters out of the Whitecomb hotel after the management refused accommodations to negro delegates. The delegates resolved to check out of their rooms and convention headquarters at the hotel within 24 hours.

Manning Johnson, negro business agent of a New York local, told the convention the hotel had excluded negro delegates because of their color.

They ended up in a fight in a nearby alley, which developed into fistfights and rock-throwing before passing separated them. The officer's report said.
