

### O'CONNOR TO FIGHT ROOSEVELT'S PURGE; SEES DICTATORSHIP

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Representative John J. O'Connor (D., N. Y.) has picked up "the gage which the president has thrown down" and pledges himself to fight the administration "purge" which he calls "an escalator to dictatorship."

"Let's have it out," he said in a broadcast address last night. "If the people of the United States desire to extend an invitation to a dictatorship, we should know about it just as speedily as possible."

His speech was a reply to the statement of President Roosevelt earlier in the week, calling for O'Connor's defeat in the September primary election. O'Connor, seeking re-nomination for a ninth term on both Democratic and Republican tickets, will be opposed in the Democratic primary by a "100 per cent New Dealer," James H. Pay, deputy collector of internal revenue.

"It is not the challenge to me personally that matters," O'Connor said. "The president's attack on me and other members of congress is a

challenge to America and its present form of government.

"The repulsive disavowal of any desire to become a dictator cannot be taken at full faith when actions evidence the contrary," he said.

4 hard-cooked eggs, sliced  
 1/4 cup diced celery  
 1-3 cup sliced cucumbers  
 2 tablespoons chopped onions  
 2 tablespoons chopped green peppers  
 2 tablespoons chopped sour pickles  
 2 tablespoons chopped olives (optional)

1/4 teaspoon salt  
 1/4 teaspoon paprika  
 1-3 cup salad dressing  
 2 tablespoons chili sauce  
 Mix and chill ingredients. Serve in a bowl lined with salad green.

Browned Eggplant  
 1 eggplant  
 4 tablespoons salt  
 1 egg or 2 yolks  
 3 tablespoons milk  
 1/2 cup cornmeal  
 1/4 teaspoon pepper  
 1/2 tablespoons fat

Remove skin from eggplant and cut it into one-inch slices. Sprinkle with salt and let stand for one hour. Rinse off in cold water. Beat egg and milk together. Dip eggplant slices into egg and then into cornmeal. Sprinkle with pepper. Brown in frying pan. Cover. Cook until tender.

Fruit Custard  
 1-3 cup granulated sugar  
 3 tablespoons flour  
 1/4 teaspoon salt  
 2 egg yolks, beaten  
 1 cup pineapple juice  
 1/2 cup orange juice  
 3 tablespoons lemon juice  
 1/2 cup water  
 1/2 cup diced pineapple  
 1-3 cup sliced oranges  
 2 egg whites, beaten

Blend thoroughly the sugar, flour and salt. Add yolks, fruit juices and water. Cook in a double boiler until thickened, stirring frequently. Cool. Fold in other ingredients. Chill.

### BRITISH FORCES BATTLE NATIVES

JERUSALEM, Aug. 19.—(AP)—A fresh battle between Britain's scrappy Irish Guards and killed Scotsmen of the Black Watch and an Arab guerrilla band today brought the casualty list for two days of bloody conflict to 65 dead and hundreds wounded.

Today's conflict occurred on the plain of Sharon and followed closely yesterday's battle on the outskirts of Acre. The two days' fighting was the heaviest the Holy Land has seen in the current reign of bloodshed, which became serious July 8. Sixty Arabs were killed—50 near

acre and at least 10 in the Sharon battle—and hundreds wounded in the two engagements, while five British soldiers lost their lives. Thirteen Britons were wounded.

The Sharon battle started near Kalkiyeh, an Arab center, when a patrol of the Irish Guards was ambushed and a British army motor-truck damaged when it passed over a land mine.

Two Die in Crash  
 SEATTLE, Aug. 19.—(P)—An auto-truck collision took two lives when the two machines came together last night near Duvall, south of Monroe. William McCall, 33, Snohomish, and Carl McNeill, about 30, Everett, were the victims. Gordon McNeill, 28, a brother, was in a critical condition later.

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
