PIRATES EXTEND FLAG RACE LEAD BY ROUTING DEAN

Dizzy Loses First With Cubs—Phillies Down Giants—Reds And Cards Split.

CHICAGO, Aug. 20.—(AP)—The Pittsburgh Pirates extended their National league lead to five and one-half games today by defeating the Chicago Cubs, 3 to 2, while the New York Giants were bowing to the Philadelphia Phillies.

Although the Pirates' veteran Red Lucas, their only pitcher who had gone nine innings against the Cubs this year, failed to go the route today, the league leaders drove Dizzy Dean from the mound.

It was Dean's first loss since his purchase by the Cubs. Although he has been credited with six victories, it was the sixth time in nine starts he has failed to go nine innings.

Medford's crashing Craters, driving toward their first Southern Oregon league pennant in years and years, clash with the tough and tough Glendale Loggers today at the high school park in the next-to-last game of the second-half race. The battle, earmarked as one of the most vital of the season, starts at 2:30 o'clock.

Bill Rathke, the game little right-hander with the crazy pitching delivery, has been nominated by Manager Paul "Hoosier" Hoffard to open on the Crater mound, with Ray Erickson, another right-hander, held in reserve.

For Glendale, Glenn Elliott, brilliant 18-year-old Myrtle Creek south-paw with the sweeping curve ball, will be on the rubber, with Merle Johnson, a right-hander, ready to take over if needed.

This ball game today will mark the first appearance of Medford's hard-hitting club under the leadership of P.J. Hooper, popular veteran who has been wrecking circuit fences hereabouts for the past 11 seasons. Hooper was named manager of the team early last week following the resignation of Wally Rickert, and Crater players are determined to make him a present of a victory this afternoon.

Another "first appearance" will be made when Riney Cook, former Lincoln field center star, takes his place on third base for the Craters. Cook, a Phoenix high athletic coach, was signed two weeks ago, so will be eligible for action today. He is a right-handed hitter and possesses a powerful throwing arm.

Although the Loggers have won only one victory during the second-half race, they will be doubly dangerous today because of Elliott, who batters every other American because of heated feelings caused by the forfeited game business several weeks ago in which Glendale was forced to forfeit an encounter to the Craters when they became mixed up in the schedule and traveled to Medford when the game was supposed to be played in Glendale.

All three league games today will be extremely crucial, as a defeat for any of the three top teams will mean virtual elimination from the second-half race. Only one more week of play remains after today. Other encounters see Ashland at Grants Pass and Yreka at Crescent City.

BALL TOSSED 708 FEET SNARED BY INDIAN'S CATCHER

CLEVELAND, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Henry Hariz Helf, Cleveland's third string catcher, stood today in Cleveland's public square and speared a ball thrown off the terminal tower, 708 feet up, to break the altitude catching record established 30 years ago when Gabby Street caught a ball thrown from the top of the Washington monument, 550 feet high.

Mathematicians estimated the balls were traveling 138 miles an hour when caught.

"For a second I didn't know if it was going to hit my head or glove," said Helf.

Later little Frankie Pytlak, Cleveland catcher, grabbed another one tossed from the tower but the 25,000 who craned their necks for a view gave most of the plaudits to Hank.

The stunt was sponsored by the Come-to-Cleveland committee. Ken Keltner, Indian third baseman who took the temporary pitching mound on the 52nd floor, hurled 12 balls. The other 10 dropped in shrubbery and on concrete walks, giving Catcher Rolfe Hemaley and Coach Johnny Bassler and Wally Shank no chance to break down the hall of fame door.

The balls that missed connections bounced six stories into the air.

GERMANY'S DAVIS CUP TEAM LOSES; IS ORDERED HOME

BROOKLINE, Mass., Aug. 20.—(P)—Badly beaten by Australia in the first three matches of the Davis cup tennis team today was "requested" to cut short its American tour and return home for a "rest."

A cablegram from Capt. E. C. Schoeborn, president of the German tennis federation, reached F. O. Uhl, non-playing captain of the German team, shortly before Henner Henkel and Georg Von Metaxa, the German singles players, took the court against Adrian Quist and Jack Bromwich, respectively, in the final two matches of the playoff.

Both German players were stunned by the news. They had been counting on playing in the United States national doubles championships starting here on Monday, in the national singles at Forest Hills in September and in other tournaments on the Pacific coast later.

The ailing Henkel took the court and merely went through the motions as he took a 6-2, 6-1, 8-6 blast from Quist. Metaxa was little better as Bromwich polished him off at 6-3, 6-2, 6-1 to provide the Australians with the clean sweep of the series that their coach, George M. Lott, had predicted. They had clinched the right to meet the United States for the cup by winning the doubles yesterday.
