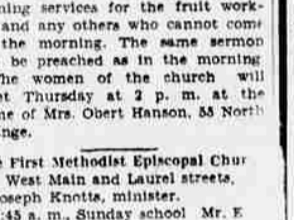
Spudmen Told to Vote Agreement
CORVALLIS, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Oregon potato growers will profit from adoption of the pending AAA potato marketing program in the opinion of G. R. Hyslop, head of the plant industries division at Oregon State college, who has broadcast a recommendation that growers vote favorably in the referendum which ends Wednesday, August 24.
After studying the agreement in detail and taking part in many growers' meetings, Hyslop said that the interests of all elements in the

Industry are protected and that adoption of the plan will raise the whole price structure to the benefit of growers in all 15 of the late potato states included in the program.
"The marketing agreement will enable the potato growers to use the U. S. department of agriculture to help themselves to stabilize prices," said Hyslop. "If the agreement goes into effect every one of the 15 late potato states will be on the same basis."

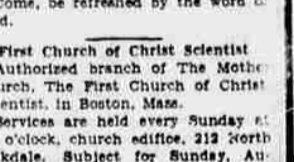
