CRIPPLED CHILD MOURNS 'MICKEY' BELOVED TOMCAT

Far up in the hills of the Coleman Creek country a little four-year-old girl, afflicted by infantile paralysis since nine months of age, grieves for her missing pet, Mickey, an angora tomcat.

The little girl's mother is dead, her father away in search of work, and Mickey, companion and playfellow, was about the only source of pleasure for the child. In fact, her grandmother, Mrs. Henrietta La Monte, explains in a letter to the Mail Tribune, Mickey was probably the best loved cat in all the world.

From her mesager returns from the sale of eggs, the grandmother's only income, enough was spared to buy liver and other tidbits dear to the feline palate.

"We have no music, no pleasures; life is hard work and dull for us," says the grandmother, "but if only Mickey could be returned to the baby, she, at least, would be happy."

The missing mouser is described as black with white under body, smoky colored toes, white dots on nose and having a white ring far down around the left hind leg.

The family moved from Griffin Creek to Coleman creek in July and the pet has been missing since that time.

TAVERN BURGLAR KILLED BY OWNER

SEATTLE, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Charles Bureau, part owner of a Howell street tavern, shot and killed one armed burglar suspect and wounded another early today when they broke into the rear of the tavern. Police identified the dead man as Donald Albert R. MacDougal, 23, his critically wounded companion as Melvin White, 22, both paroled from the state reformatory at Monroe.

Bureau said he and his partner, Luther McCulloch, have taken turns sleeping in the tavern after the place was entered four times by thieves the past four months.

Bureau, a veteran of the wartime 61st division, said the men awakened him by a 15-minute onslaught on the back door with a crowbar. He fired two shotgun shells as the men entered the place.

FOUR FOUND DEAD IN HUNGER STRIKE

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Warden William B. Mills of the county prison at Holmesburg, where a "hunger strike" has been in progress since last Friday, said today four prisoners were found dead in their cells.

Dr. Charles H. Hensch said there were no marks of violence on the bodies. He did not say what might have caused the deaths.

Mills said those dead were Edward Hayes, James McQuade, Harry Osborne and Joseph Walters.

He described the men as "disturbers" but refused to say whether the men were among those who had refused food in a protest against what the striking prisoners called "monotony" in the prison diet.

Earlier Mills had said only 13 of the original 650 strikers continued to refuse to eat after going without food for the week-end.
