PRESSURE CUFF USED IN LATEST TREATMENT OF PARALYSIS CASES

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (UP)—Physical therapy is employed at the University of Minnesota hospital to aid patients regain the use of disease-stiffened arms and legs. Besides the swimming pool, where patients who are slowly regaining use of limbs left helpless by infantile paralysis, diathermy machines and ultra violet lamps are used in the treatment. Two relatively new pieces of apparatus, the pax machine and the pressure cuff, are also employed by physical therapists.

The pax machine resembles a glass boot which fits over the leg. A motor alternately creates a pressure and vacuum to stimulate circulation. The machine is useful in warding off gangrene or aiding circulatory systems attacked by hardening of the arteries.

The pressure cuff accomplishes much the same purpose. However, the body does the work instead of a motor. The cuff resembles a band doctors wrap around the arm for taking blood pressure.

Pressure is turned on for two and one-half minutes after the pressure cuff is in place around arm or leg. During this time, blood in veins is stopped, and only arteries function. The arteries carry blood to the veins, which dilate and force blood into smaller blood vessels where richer circulation is needed.

WIFE OF MAESTRO MUCH IMPROVED

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 23.—(AP)—Mrs. Emilia Krueger, wife of Karl Krueger, symphony conductor, is much better, hospital attendants said today. They optimistically reported her condition was the best it has been since she was brought here Friday night suffering from bullet wounds inflicted by her maid's jealous husband. Last night, her voice diminished by pain, Mrs. Krueger gave police a "deathbed" statement, as Charles McDonald, the 29-year-old unemployed electrician was charged with assault with intent to murder her. He is held under \$50,000 bond.

WITHHOLD EXECUTION OF ROSSER SENTENCE

McMINNVILLE, Aug. 23.—(AP)—Circuit Judge Arlie Walker withheld execution today of the 12-year prison sentence imposed upon Al E. Rosser, former secretary of the Oregon Council of AFL teamster unions, by signing a writ of probable cause. Rosser, who was convicted of complicity in the arson plot which destroyed a non-union box factory at West Salem last fall, thus will remain in jail pending action upon an appeal to the supreme court.

CHINESE MOBILIZING HUGE FORCE TO KEEP JAPS OUT OF HANKOW

SHANGHAI, Aug. 23.—(AP)—A million soldiers and 200,000 civilians were reported mobilized today to protect the Hankow area should the Japanese break the deadlock that has kept them 110 miles from the provincial Chinese capital for nearly a month. The Chinese civilians were being trained in many behind-the-line duties in the Hankow district. Included were 80,000 hankow pullers who would become a troop transport corps. Chinese newspapers which reported these details also said women were being given important roles as nurses and military aids. A women's corps was being trained to be medical workers in the front lines. Many college graduates, members of leading Chinese families, were said to be among the corps members. The Chinese-Japanese struggle for mastery of Poyang lake, about 135 miles southeast of Hankow, continued today with undiminished fury.

"Birth of a Baby" Now at Craterian

There has never before been a picture like "The Birth of a Baby," which opened at the Craterian theatre yesterday. The usual critical vocabulary is useless in discussing the film, for the film itself is more than just a movie. It is truth; vital, exciting, clean and unshamed truth. About all a reviewer can do is tell what the picture is about and then stand on a street corner and exhort passers-by to hurry to the Craterian theatre and see for themselves. Filmed under the guidance of the American Committee on Maternal Welfare, "The Birth of a Baby" is simply what the title implies—a film showing the processes involved in having a baby. It should be made emphatically clear, here and now, that the picture is clean. Clean as only truth can be, without a trace of the suggestive, the vulgar or the evil-minded. The story is a plain one. Mary Burgess, a typical young American wife, is going to have a baby. The doctor tells her that she has been wise in coming to him early in her pregnancy, explaining clearly the biological fundamentals involved in having babies. The climax of the picture is, of course, the minutes when the miracle of birth takes place. Only the picture as it was filmed can do justice to the power of that sequence, a power religious in its intensity and purity.
