

PRIVATE FLIERS WILL HAVE PART IN CONFAB HERE

Fifth Northwest Aviation Planning Council Will Set Aside Time for Problems of Private Pilots

Private fliers and fixed base operators will play an important part in the program of the fifth Northwest Aviation Planning Council to be held here September 16 and 17, it was announced today by A. H. Banwell, program chairman.

A certain amount of time has been set aside in the two-day program for a discussion of the problems of private flying, and questions such as department of commerce regulations and legal aspects of private flying state aeronautic boards and regulation of private fliers, the future for private fliers and recommendations for simplified regulations will be included in the program. These subjects will be discussed by Louis A. Warner of Spokane; Dr. Paul Sharp, chairman of the Oregon state board of aeronautics, Klamath Falls; Harry K. Coffey, Portland, and Charles Smith, Seattle.

At previous council meetings, little time has been devoted to the

question of the problems of the fixed base operator. For that reason, fixed base operators will be offered an opportunity to discuss their problems at the Medford meeting, Banwell stated.

A representative of the recently formed civil aeronautics authority will attend the council meeting, as will Major General Oscar Westover, chief of the United States air corps, and other prominent aviation authorities from all over the United States.

National defense, airports, feeder lines, airplane manufacturers and amateur aircraft building are but a few of the subjects which will be covered at the meeting.

Although the meeting is a little under a month away, reservations for some are being received daily and it is expected that this will be the best attended meeting since the inception of the Northwest Aviation Planning Council two years ago.

E. G. Harlan of Boise, Idaho, is the general chairman for the event.

FORTY MILLION NOW ON AGE INSURANCE BOOKS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—(AP)—Enrollment for old age insurance accounts has passed the 40 million mark, the social security board announced today. New applications during July totaled 523,269, making the total 40,097,446.

The board certified for payment in July 14,900 old age insurance claims for \$785,662. This brought certified claims to 184,600 and payments to \$8,700,000 since the program became effective January 1, 1937.

DWIGHT RANDALL OUTSTANDING IN WEATHER BUREAU

Dwight L. Randall, former Medford resident now on duty in the map room of the U. S. weather bureau in Washington, D. C., will be sent by the bureau to Massachusetts Institute of Technology for special training in aeronautics and research work in meteorology, according to word received here.

The recently created civil aeronautics authority gave the bureau permission to send ten men to school for the training, but lack of funds cut the number to four—two being assigned to M.I.T. and two to California Institute of Technology. Mr. Randall's inclusion in this number was regarded as exceptional recognition of his capabilities.

Mr. Randall came to Medford with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. D. Randall of the American Sunday School union, in 1923. He graduated from Medford high school in 1926 and entered the weather service as a minor observer here about ten years ago. After leaving Medford he was given a number of assignments in various parts of the country, earning steady advancement. While stationed in New Orleans he worked a night shift in order to attend Tulane university, from which he graduated with B.S. degree in 1937.

From New Orleans Randall was transferred to his present post at the

capital. He was married to Miss Evelyn Sampson of Brentwood, Md., a year ago. Mrs. Randall is also employed in civil service, being assigned with a government agency detailed to the White House. Mr. Randall's parents reside at 96 Berkeley Way, in Medford.
