

HITLER EFFUSIVE IN FAREWELL TO VISITING HORTHY

Fuhrer Holds Hungarian's Hand Five Minutes As Climax to Visit—Sudeten Given Permit to Fight

BERLIN, Aug. 26. (AP)—Reichsfuhrer Hitler held the hand of his departing guest a full five minutes today as he bade farewell to Adm. Nicholas Horthy, regent of Hungary, who ended a history-making visit of state to the German capital.

Before this parting at the railway station informed persons asserted the visit already had laid groundwork for closer economic ties than ever between Germany and Hungary.

BERLIN, Aug. 26. (AP)—The DNB (official German news agency) published today a Sudeten German proclamation said to have been issued in Praha which, in effect, gave members of the autonomy-seeking minority party freedom to strike back whenever they consider themselves attacked.

It professed to withdraw previous instructions "even to forego the right of self-defense."

PRAGA, Aug. 26. (AP)—Disclosures of a German diplomatic declaration of intentions in several European capitals on the Sudeten German issue and of new Praha government concessions to its autonomy-demanding German minority came almost simultaneously here today.

Information reaching the Czechoslovak government indicated Germany had told other powers she might have to act "to sponsor" the Sudeten German demands if a solution were too long delayed, but such action would not be in the nature of an attack.

The threat of the government concessions was not revealed, but it was known they formed the subject of a conference between Viscount Runciman, official British mediator in this conflict, and a committee of the Sudeten German party.

Described by a government spokesman as "material" and as a likely "new basis for negotiation," they were put forward by the political ministers of the Czechoslovak government last night and raised hopes of negotiations trying to overcome the deadlock.

'GO-AHEAD' FLAG FALLS TONIGHT IN PUSHMOBILE RACE

Home-Made Speed Wagons Will Roar Down East Main Starting at 6:30—Glory, Prizes for Winners

Officials of the first annual Mail Tribune-Scout Cub midjet speeder derby flashed the green light today for 26 drivers and their home-constructed vehicles, who on East Main street this evening will send their racing creations roaring down a one-quarter mile speedway in search of the victor's honor, glory and loot.

The derby will start promptly at 6:30 o'clock, with the speeders catapulting off a city-constructed ramp at the end of the wide pavement at the top of the hill on East Main street, and breasting the tape at Williamette avenue. Streetcar tracks on East Main street have been filled in and resurfaced by the city, placing the derby race track in excellent condition.

Three More Enter Last-minute entries increased the number of speeders from 23 to 26, the trio of latecomers being entered in class C. There will be 10 creations entered in class A, 10 in class B, and 6 in class C. The winners of classes A and B will be determined after two elimination heats, with the first two finishers in each two heats of the two classes meeting in the finals. There will probably be only one heat in class C.

Progression of the derby will be as follows: first heat, class B; first heat, class A; second heat, class B; second heat, class A; finals, class B; finals, class A; finals in class C.

There will be five entrants in each of the class A and B heats. For instance, the first and second place speeders in the first class A heat will enter the finals with the first and second place speeders in the first and second class A heat, making a total of four class A vehicles which will

race in the class A finals. The same method of reaching the finals will be followed in class B.

Clyde Fichtner, city traffic officer, will precede all speeders down the track and tow the two winners back to the starting point at the conclusion of each heat.

East Main street, from the top of the hill to Crater Lake avenue, will be blocked to traffic and parking during the derby, but spectators will find plenty of standing room on the sidewalks along the race route. A public address system operated by Guy Davis will keep the crowd informed of the progress of the derby.

Not listed yesterday but cooperating with officials in making the derby a success have been Alexander's grocery and the Woods Lumber company.

LAKE OF WOODS GETS FISH QUOTA

Supervisor Karl L. Janouch of the Rogue River national forest service announced today the completion of the fish-planting program in the Lake of the Woods district, first area to receive its full quota of fish.

A total of 101,100 rainbow and eastern brook trout have been planted in the district, he stated, with 30,000 rainbow placed in Island lake, 25,000 rainbow in Heavenly Twins lake, 20,000 eastern brook in Four-mile lake, 1,000 eastern brook in Dee lake and 1,500 in Bert lake.

In the Butte Falls district, 14,400 rainbow trout have been planted in the upper middle fork of Rogue river and 22,000 rainbow in the Blue canyon lake, he stated. Two other districts remain to receive their complete quota of trout—Applegate and Union Creek, he said.
