

Danielle Darrieux Makes Film Debut at Craterian In "Rage of Paris"

DOUG FAIRBANKS JR. WITH FRENCH STAR IN SPEEDY COMEDY

With an all star cast in support under the baton of one of Hollywood's ablest directors, Danielle Darrieux, sensational French screen star, makes her expectedly awaited American film debut in "The Rage of Paris," comedy romance, which comes to the Craterian theatre today for three days.

Luminary of both the French stage and screen, this twenty-one year old beauty has appeared in some of the most successful European films in recent seasons. She is perhaps best known for her role opposite Charles Boyer in "Mayerling" which won the New York cinema critics' prize as the best foreign film of the past year.

"The Rage of Paris" presents the petite Danielle as a little French girl who lands in New York, broke and jobless and takes a job posing in the nude for a famous artist. But in her excitement at landing a job she snatches up the wrong address and begins to pose in the office of Fairbanks, a young advertising executive. Then he walks in and from there on the situations develop with speed and comic impact.

Forty-seven sets, ranging from hotel and hunting lodge exteriors to luxurious apartment and office interiors, were used in filming of the production.

2500 PEOPLE SEE TRIB-CUB SCOUT SPEEDER CONTEST

Before an estimated crowd of 2500 spectators lining the sidewalks along the quarter-mile route on East Main street Friday evening, the first annual Mall Tribune-Scout Cub midget speeder derby was staged, with boys from 9 to 15 years of age sending their home-constructed vehicles spinning off a ramp at the top of East Main street to the finish line at Willamette avenue. Twenty-three youthful "Barney Oldfield" called speeders in the event, entry by all a tremendous success.

Don Smith, 12-year old son of

Ralph W. Smith, driving "Tegalong," won the class A championship, entered by boys 12 to 15 years old, inclusive. Class B winner was Norman House, 11, son of Mrs. Floyd House of 1013 West Eleventh street. He piloted his "Cub" to first place by a 10-foot margin over Donald Williamson in "Thunderbolt." George Bryant, 14, son of Mrs. Harry Bryant of 1312 Reddy avenue, drove his "24" to victory in the class C finals.

Strangely, the winning time for the quarter-mile race was faster in the class B finals than in class A. Norman House won the class B championship in one minute flat, while Don Smith's time in winning the class A title was one minute, 22 seconds. Young House, therefore, drove his vehicle at an average of 15 miles an hour, considerably faster than the speed of any of the other midget automobiles.

Classes A and B were run off in two heats each, with the two winners of each heat meeting in the finals. The entire derby was staged in 30 minutes, due to the excellent

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4-H CLUBBERS TO JUDGE LIVESTOCK ON TUESDAY TOUR

Members Will Meet At Court House At 8:30 A. M.—To Select Teams For Fair And Exposition.

All Jackson county livestock club members will meet at the courthouse at 8:30 a. m. Tuesday to begin a stock judging tour and contest for the purpose of selecting the two high teams to represent the county at the state fair and Pacific International Livestock Exposition.

The route has not been completely arranged yet but classes in beef, dairy, sheep and hogs will be judged. A basket lunch will be eaten at the Tucker ranch on the Rogue river; noon and classes of Hereford cattle judged afterward.

Everyone interested in livestock or 4-H club work is invited to go on the tour.

Two-Day Tour Held

Jackson and Josephine county 4-H club members joined in holding an overnight livestock tour and judging practice last Monday and Tuesday. Fifty boys and girls from the two counties met at Raphael Benran's farm north of Medford where classes of Duroc Jersey hogs were judged and Guernsey cattle were observed.

Benson secured his original Duroc Jersey hogs two years ago from Edwin Ridder of Sherwood, Oregon. Ridder developed his herd of Durocs during his 4-H club career and at the present time is considered one of the outstanding Duroc Jersey breeders on the coast.

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Second stop was at the Bill Daugherty farm on the Crater Lake highway where Holstein cattle were judged. The Daugherty cattle are stock from the Carleton, Farms and include the two strains Matador and Ormsby and Sir Iuka Mae, both families being widely known for their high production.

Lunch was eaten in Lathia park in Ashland after which the group went to the Mt. Crest Hereford ranch at Hill, California where purebred Southdown sheep and Hereford cattle were judged. Fred Baylies, manager of the Mt. Crest ranch, devoted much time in showing the club members how to fit their sheep and cattle and in pointing out the important things to be considered in judging.

C. A. Winetrou of Grants, Pa., who is making some moving picture reels of 4-H club activities, took several feet of pictures during the tour. Advice is given.

After a campfire supper the boys and girls gathered around a large council fire while Baylies discussed livestock club work with them and went to quite an extent to tell them how to select, feed, fit and exhibit their animals.

L. J. Allen, assistant state leader for boys, was present and talked to the members regarding their projects.

After looking over the cattle and pastures on the upper Mt. Crest ranch Tuesday the group returned to Jackson Hot Springs for a swim and lunch and then went to the J. E. McCracken farm in Valley View where purebred Jerseys were judged.

McCracken told the boys and girls how he has built his herd from one good cow and pointed out the character in a good milk cow and what to look for in keeping breeding stock. McCracken has a herd of 19 Jerseys which have averaged 500 pounds of butter fat production each year for the past three years.

O. K. Beals, county agent of Josephine county and C. D. Conrad, club agent of Jackson county were in charge of the tour and considered it a real success from the standpoint of combined education and recreation for the members and are both in favor of making the tour an annual event.
