BOTH SIDES CLAIMING IMPORTANT VICTORIES IN WAR HARRIED CHINA

SHANGHAI, Sept. 2. — (AP) — Severe fighting raged along the Yangtze and Yellow rivers today with both Chinese and Japanese claiming important victories.

Chinese military commanders said their forces inflicted 4000 casualties on the Japanese tried to advance toward the Yangtze river about 100 miles southeast of Hankow, the provisional capital. The Chinese also reported they recaptured Anhui, keypoint for a Japanese offensive toward Tolan on the Nanchang-Kiukiang railway. A Japanese column, however, was said to have reached a point three miles from Tolan with the hope of joining another column that was marching from Yangtze so both could attack the railway north of Tolan.

The Japanese asserted their land and river forces were closing in on Matowehien, Anhwei province, in a move to bottle up Chinese positions east of the Kiukiang sector. More than 100 Japanese planes bombed the defenders' lines.

At Hwangmei, 25 miles north of Kiukiang and 105 miles southeast of Hankow, the Chinese said they fought the invaders to a standstill in hand-to-hand battle.

RED SECRETARY DENIES BRIDGES EVER MEMBER

SEATTLE, Sept. 2. — (AP) — Earl Browder, general secretary of the Communist party and presidential candidate two years ago, said today Harry Bridges, Pacific coast CIO leader, is not and never has been a member of the party.

His announcement, made at a press conference, follows the recent demands by Rep. Martin Dies, chairman of the house committee investigating un-American forces, for the deportation of Bridges on charges Bridges is a Communist. Browder arrived here today from California.

Browder commented on other questions. "We support the New Deal even though we don't consider it a final solution, not even a step toward socialism," he said.

NEW YORK, Sept. 2. — (AP) — Transcribed records of wire-tapped evidence were read today in the policy racket conspiracy trial of Tammany district leader James J. Hines as a purported conversation between J. Richard (Dixie) Davis, the "kid mouthpiece" of the Dutch Schultz policy mob, and a man identified as "Jim."

After a surprise start to the day's session, with defense counsel Lloyd Paul Stryker announcing he was through with his cross-examination of Davis, Detective Julius Salke took the stand and read a wire-tapped conversation.

A man named "Joe" was quoted as calling Davis' wire-tapped telephone in 1933, saying, "the boss wants to talk with you."

Another voice came on the phone. "Hello, Dick," it said. "Can you let me have \$500?"

Davis replied: "Yes, Jim." I'm going downtown with Johnny Dietz and I'll send Ed Nolley over," Salke quoted the record.

The call, Detective Salke said, was made at 8:30 a. m., on Sept. 28, 1933—about a year after Hines, according to testimony by previous witnesses, joined the Schultz mob as political fixer at a fee of \$500 a week.

The witness said he had met Davis before he tapped the gang lawyer's telephone and knew his voice.

Chicago Newspaper To Become Tabloid

CHICAGO, Sept. 2. — (AP) — The Chicago Herald and Examiner announced today it would be published in tabloid size beginning with next Monday's editions.

The paper's announcement said the Herald and Examiner would be the 54th newspaper in the United States to adopt the tabloid size. Its price, effective with the change, will be reduced from three cents to two in Chicago and suburbs.

The Herald and Examiner is one of three morning newspapers in Chicago. One of the others is primarily a financial publication.

PRISON OFFICIALS HELD IN 'BAKING' DEATH OF INMATES

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 2. — (AP) — Supt. William B. Mills, Deputy Warden Frank A. Craven, ten guards and two physicians of the Philadelphia county prison were held without bail today for the grand jury after a coroner's jury found them criminally negligent in the "baking" deaths of four convicts.

All were taken into custody immediately in a crowded city hall courtroom at the conclusion of a three-day inquest.

The guards named were Capt. James McGuire, Alfred W. Brough, Francis Smith, Edward Corkery, Samuel James, Thomas Cavanaugh, John Mulheirn, Sylvester Weaver, William Staines and Robert Morrow. The physicians were Dr. Hans Abraham, resident at the prison, and Dr. George Enoch, who visited it.

After deliberating three hours, the specially-selected jury of six named this group as responsible, directly or indirectly, for allowing 25 hunger-striking convicts to suffer for 20 to 60 hours in a stuffy isolation building heated by a battery of large radiators in a corridor.

Four prisoners suffocated, and the others were weakened and made ill. The district attorney's office has indicated it would ask the grand jury to indict those responsible on charges of homicide or manslaughter.
