

# Parsons Defeats Don Thompson, Portland, 3-2, In Golf Upset

## SEATTLE GOLFER SETS FAST PACE, ROUTS FAVORITE

### Bentley, Ashland Defending Titlist, To Play Hanen, Today — Tournament Scores.

With the exception of one match, the startling upset turned in by George Parsons of Seattle in eliminating Portland's Don Thompson, runner-up last year and one of the pre-tournament favorites, by a margin of 3 and 2, the 19th annual Southern Oregon Golf Association golf championship moved into the quarter-finals yesterday afternoon at the Rogue Valley Golf club, with favorites coming through their first two rounds unscathed.

Advancing to the round-of-eight were five Medford clubbers, an 18-year-old sensation from Marshfield, Parsons, and defending Champion Hubert Bentley of Ashland. Those eight shotmakers reached the quarter-finals after 36 holes of match play in two rounds, and as they advanced, golfers in seven other flights moved into their quarter-finals.

Teeling off this morning in the quarter-final rounds of the championship flight will be Leland Clark of Medford and Bill Selkirk, Jr. of Medford. Eddie Simmons of Medford and George Parsons of Seattle. Hubert Bentley of Ashland and Dick Hanen of Marshfield, and George Harrington of Medford and Bob Hammond of Medford. The first match, Clark versus Selkirk, starts at 9 o'clock, and the others will drive off at five-minute intervals.

The winners of those four 18-hole matches will face off starting at 1:30 this afternoon in the semi-finals, and the two ultimate victors in those round-of-four matches will battle it out in the 36-hole final tomorrow. First 18 holes of the championship match will start at 9:35 a. m. Monday, with the final round getting under way at 1:30 p. m.

All second-round matches in all other flights, and first-round matches in consolation flights, will be played this morning. Semi-final matches will be run off this afternoon, and finals will be staged tomorrow morning.

Parsons, shooting excellent golf, provided the first tournament upset when he ousted Thompson in the second round of the championship flight yesterday afternoon. The blond-haired Portland shotmaker was considered one of the favorites, but he was unable to keep pace with the high-flying Seattleite. By his amazing victory over Thompson, Parsons became almost an even bet to defeat Medford's Eddie Simmons in the quarter-finals this morning.

Leland Clark, who copped medalist honors for the third straight year Friday by belting out a brilliant 68, two under par and the lowest medal score in the history of the tournament, eliminated F. Beeks of Longview, Wash., 2 and 1. Bill Selkirk, Jr., won his way to the quarter-finals by eliminating Marvin Clark of Grants Pass, 4 and 3, and Eddie Simmons kept pace with his Medford teammate by beating Jack Woods, 5 and 4.

Hubert Bentley, gunning for his second consecutive championship, slugged out an 8 and 6 and last year's Oregon state junior champion, beat Vern Green of Grants Pass, 6 and 5; George Harrington, Medford Junior high athletic coach, eliminated Bob Woods, Jacksonville high coach, 3 and 2; and Busting Bob Hammond nosed out William Zimmerman of Cottage Grove, 2 and 1.

Those 16 who claimed in the second round of the championship flight had previously eliminated 16 others during the morning round, the defeated 16 automatically dropping into the first flight.

## CRATERS INVADE PASS TODAY FOR PLAY-OFF TITLE

### The determined drive of Medford's crashing Craters to the second-half Southern Oregon league baseball pennant ends in success or defeat today at Grants Pass, when Manager Paul "Hooster" Hoffard sends his terrific-hitting club against the Merchants of Manager Jud Pernoll in the play-off game for the title. The battle starts at 2:30 sharp at the Josephine county fairgrounds.

Looming on the baseball horizon is a tight pitchers battle between young Lyle Turpin, Medford's righthander from Klamath Falls and Orval Hoffmann, youthful starboard flinger of the Merchants and property of the St. Louis Browns.

Both managers will send the above named pitchers, although Steve Crippen, another orthodox hurler, may possibly get the last-minute nod for Grants Pass. Bill Hatke and Ray Erickson will be Medford's reserve choppers.

The winner of today's game will become undisputed second-half champion and earn the right to face Crescent City, first-half winners, for the loop pennant. Medford and Grants Pass ended the second-half schedule docked for first place with seven wins and one loss. The championship series with Crescent City will be the best two out of three games.

Although Grants Pass hasn't been defeated on its home field all season, local fans believe the Craters will snap the winning streak and bring home the title, basing their predictions on the fact that Medford carries more dynamic offensive punch than any club in the circuit.

Neither team plans any changes in their lineups. A large delegation of local supporters will accompany the Craters to Grants Pass.

## BELCASTRO FACES GLOVED SOCKEYE ON MONDAY CARD

### Fete Belcastro and Sockeye Jack McDonald, two of the meanest, toughest wrestlers to appear in the local armory in years, encase their huge fists in regulation eight-ounce boxing gloves tomorrow night and hammer it out for 10 rounds or less in the first professional prizefight seen here in over 24 months.

McDonald, the ex-Seattle logger and former pugilist, is a slight favorite among the betting gentry of the village, who are backing their predictions with a considerable amount of hard cash.

Belcastro, Mad Italian from Weed, Cal., and himself an ex-pug, has plenty of backers, however. Many fans figure Pete is too smart for the young McDonald, although admitting that Belcastro probably won't prove such a devastating hitter.

Promoter Mack Lillard said yesterday that reservations for ringside seats were pouring into ticket agencies, and that a jammed armory was in prospect. He warned all fans to obtain tickets as soon as possible.

It is not believed by anyone that the fight will go the limit, McDonald, in his wrestling activities here, has convinced fans he carries a terrific kick in either hand, and Belcastro, although not relying so greatly on punching ability, has proved he can wing rights and lefts with wild abandon. Both men, who hold violent dislikes for each other, are expected to start slugging at the opening bell, and not cease until one or both are stretched flat on the linoleum.

Two six-round wrestling matches will precede the heavyweight boxing brawl. In the opener, Ken Hollis returns to face Juan Sebastian, and in the second grapple affair, Alvin Britt clashes with Mike Strelch.

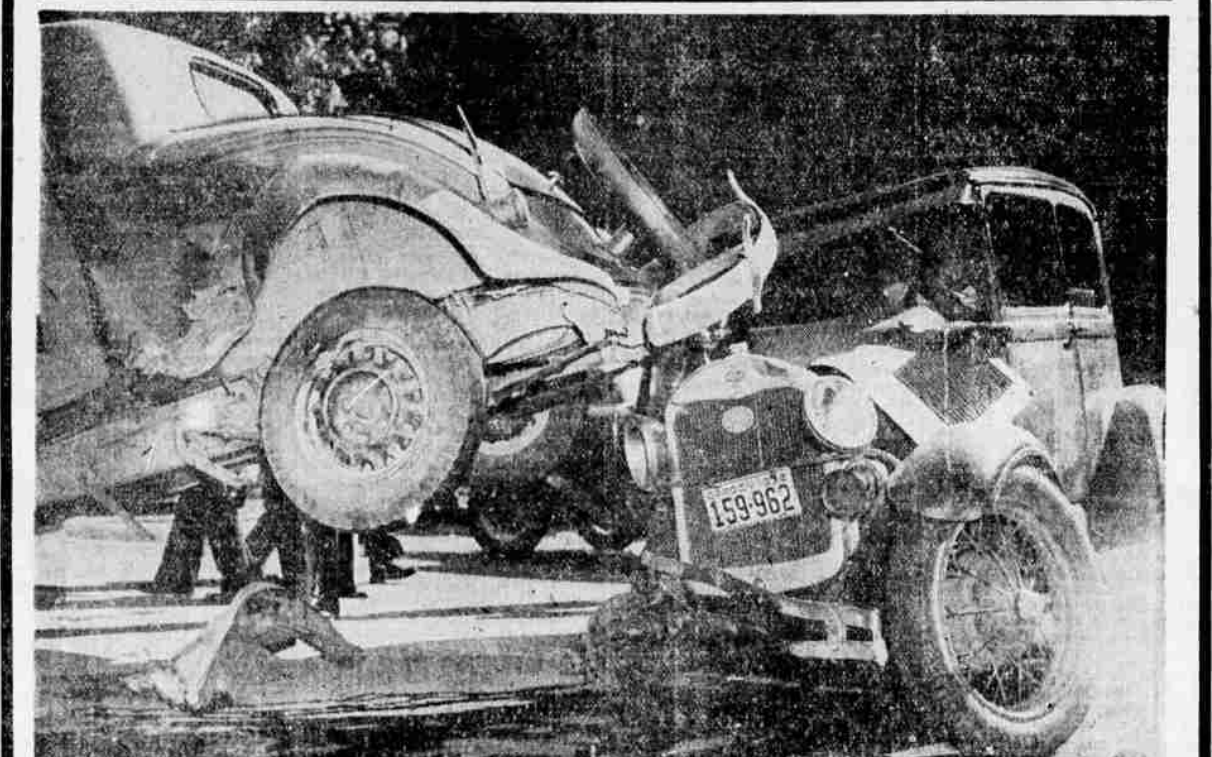
