Mrs. Maybelle Klemm gave an inspiring devotional message, taking as her topic "The fire shall ever be burning upon the altar." She commended the W. C. T. U. women for having kept alive the fire of temperance, patriotism, world peace, and good citizenship.

Mrs. Mary Anne Gates closed the service with a solo, "The Holy City." Captain R. H. Vincent of the Salvation Army gave an interesting address touching on the similar program and objectives of the Army and the W. C. T. U. Mrs. Vincent was heard in a solo, "The Twenty-third Psalm."

Mrs. Addie Halley, the only surviving member of the early days of the society, was honor guest and related stories of interest in their fight against the saloons. Mrs. Halley was president for a number of years.

Mrs. Douglas reviewed the history of the society bringing out many points of interest. Eagle Point union started in 1903; in 1906 saloons closed on Sunday on petition of W. C. T. U. and members helped raise funds for building Community hospital. Greetings were read from past presidents, Mrs. Hans Holmer of San Diego, Cal.; Mrs. L. Leonard of San Carlos, Cal.; Mrs. W. T. Berry, Hayward, Cal.; Mrs. Lucille McDonald, Portland, Ore.; Mrs. Hannah Loefer and Mrs. J. C. Woods brought greetings and Mrs. Woods told of her trip to Gettysburg. Other past presidents at the meeting were Mrs. E. S. Hilder and Mrs. Bryant. Helen Childs, who has served several terms in the office, Mrs. E. A. Oldenburg was unable to be present. Mrs. Nye, mother of Mrs. S. L. Divine told that she had been a W. C. T. U. worker for seventy years.

The following musical program was enjoyed during the afternoon: Mary Anne Gates, soprano solo, "In the Garden," cornet duet, Captain Vincent and William Schwartz, Kenneth Raymond accompanying. Accordion duet, Joan Burk and Dorothy Coffeen.

Plaid Materials Make Fashion Fall Combinations

PARIS (UP)—It's more than a bit of plaid we'll be wearing this fall, and there's certainly nothing warmer in color or fabric than a tartan to ward off winter chills. But the plaid is far from limited to itself to orthodox woollens; they burst forth on velvets and silks as well.

Perhaps Erik the hatmaker should be given credit for promoting the plaid, because almost his entire hat collection boasts a Scotch twang. However, all the dressmakers—undoubtedly helped along by Scottish Queen Elizabeth's visit to Paris—have the same idea.

"Wear your plaid for evening!" is Moynaux's daring suggestion which colorblind people should find most acceptable. He makes his plaid evening scarf of a very loose-woven wool plaid in black, red, green and white and wears it with a bright blue silk crepe evening dress sprinkled all over with sparkling blue sequins. A dash of the same wool plaid is wound around the waist of the evening dress to complete the Scotch effect.

Plaid lame, with black, red and white squares on a gold background, makes the top to a black wool crepe skirt. Skirt and top are stitched together at a low waistline to make a dressy but useful one-piece afternoon dress.

Another combination of plaid with plain materials makes a neat and youthful wool daytime dress. Short puff sleeves of gay plaid wool are set in a simple black wool dress; there is no other plaid used on the dress, but a plaid jacket—matching the dress—goes over.

Plaid jackets and coats, in fact, are made to go over almost any color dress you might want to wear underneath. Creel makes a striking and almost "collegiate" sweater coat of huge blue and yellow plaid, cut on the bias and with raglan sleeves and black trim. It's worn over a straight-angora-finished material in slate blue.

Equally smart is the red, navy and white plaid wool fitted jacket which Vera Bore combines with a slate blue wool skirt. Another house goes so far as to make a plaid blouse for a check skirt. The skirt is green and rust check; the blouse is green, black and yellow plaid; the jacket is of the skirt material, but lined with the blouse plaid.

PARIS—Persian pantaloons with jeweled anklets will lend a delightful masquerade touch to intimate dinner parties this fall and winter if the fashion world heeds the Persian dressmakers' call to "Go Persian."

The Persian trousers are perhaps the most sensational—and thus, the most interesting—to many—of the Persian trend. They were shown this month in heavy white silk crepe, their bagginess created by deep pleats fore and aft. Topping them was a gold lame blouse, comparatively tight-fitting, and around the middle was a swath of rich burgundy red silk, its scarf ends twisted into a knot and then flowing floorward.

So far, the Oriental pantaloons are the only evidence of any movement to put trousers on women—except, of course, in the hunting field or on the golf links. Perhaps even the easternrous will not "take," but it cannot be denied that they seem an attractive combination of comfort and excitement.

Jeanne Lanvin concentrated all her Persian urge on more practical afternoon and evening dresses and headgear. She chose rich Persian brocades for short afternoon dresses, simply styled but characterized by high neck bands and puffed fastenings. Her evening gowns were reminiscent of the days when all women were ladies, their trailing Oriental

draperies adding femininity with every inch of material.

Persian tunics, with their characteristic slashes, are another interesting forecast for fall, while twisted Oriental headgear is virtually a reality already. Twisted turbans of all types—some with pointed tops, others abruptly flattened as they reach their maximum height—promise to steal the glory away from more skyscraper hat shapes which make taxi-riding a task.

To climax the Persian trend, Lucien Lelong wound up his collection with the traditional wedding dress: a white crepe which this time almost spoke Persian from its draped train to its twisted turban head covering.
