Sunday in which the 1937 Ford coupe he was driving left the road and turned over several times. State police, who investigated the accident, said he was apparently not critically injured.

TWO YOUNG GIRLS HELD AS RUNAWAY SUSPECTS FROM MULTNOMAH

Although one of them refused to answer police questions, a library card was discovered in their possession bearing the name Irene English, Multnomah, Ore., and the other girl finally admitted, police said, that they were sisters and had run away from home early Sunday morning.

They were lodged in county jail, where the matron will attempt to obtain more information from them, police said.

The girls, about 16 or 17 years old, were noticed by police walking along the street shortly before midnight, and when asked where they were going they replied they were headed for home, on the east side. When they couldn't tell police their address, they were taken to the station and questioned.

WAR DEPARTMENT NAMES MEET AIDE

Major General Oscar Westover will represent the war department officially at the Northwest Aviation Planning council conference here Friday and Saturday September 16 and 17. It was stated in a telegram received by United States Senator A. Bryan Beaslee from Louis Johnson, assistant secretary of war.

Mr. Johnson, who had been invited to attend, said he regretted he would not be able to come west for the conference. He told Senator Beaslee in the telegram, however, that the war department realized the importance of the meeting and had designated Westover to be the official representative in the discussion of national defense at the Friday afternoon session.

At the Saturday luncheon, General Westover will be a speaker as chief of the army air corps.

GRILL EX-CONVICT IN GIRL'S SLAYING

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., Sept. 5.—(AP)—A blood-covered stone "as big as a man's foot" and a few strands of hair were the only clues unearthed today by police investigating the brutal slaying of eight-year-old Barbara Driscoll, whose body earlier was found stuffed under a building in Portsmouth's railroad yards.

An ex-convict, held for questioning, steadfastly denied any connection with the crime but admitted, Rockingham county attorney Stephen Wheeler said, he had been in the railroad yards during the night.

Wheeler said he was convinced the child was attacked "with intent to commit criminal assault."

Dr. Frederick S. Gray, medical referee, however, reported a preliminary investigation showed there had been no attack.
