

LABOR SECRETARY DIES OF PARALYTIC STROKE

PORTLAND, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Death following a paralytic stroke Sunday, claimed the life of Ben T. Osborne, 57, executive secretary of the Oregon State Federation of Labor, yesterday.

Osborne, who had served 12 years, was reappointed to his 13th term last June. He had been active in recent years as an opponent of dual-unionism and the CIO in Oregon.

Today plans were discussed for a funeral in the auditorium of the Portland labor temple.

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—(AP)—The stock market was aroused from its lethargy today by a sudden glow of hope for a peaceful settlement of the German minority issue in Czechoslovakia and pivotal shares turned upward abruptly.

Tidings from Praha negotiations had been broken off pending investigation of an incident between Sudeten deputies and Czechoslovak police apparently arrived too late to have material effect on prices.

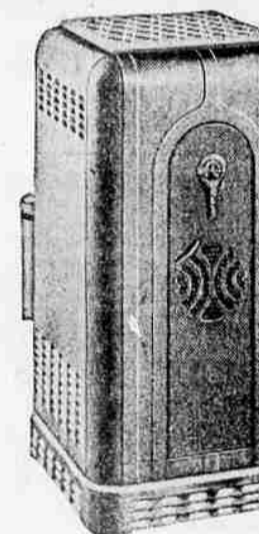
