RESTORATION FUND EARNINGS \$46,100

SALEM, (UP) — The state restoration fund, insurance paid on its own buildings by the state on a pro rata basis, has earned \$46,100.98 on invested funds since its founding in 1925. State Purchasing Agent Dan Fry has reported.

Since that fund was started each amount annually, the total not to exceed \$25,000 per year up to last year, and not to exceed \$50,000 this year.

During the time \$400,208.19 was collected. Invested at interest, the amount has returned \$46,100.98. 214.13. Losses during the life of the plan have totaled \$323,419.40, the greatest loss having been the capital fire of 1925. That loss, while much greater, was arbitrarily fixed at \$11,000.

The fund now has a favorable balance of \$123,794.73. Fry said the amount would be sufficient to care for any ordinary fire losses.

SOPHIA SWINDLER, 77, OF EAGLE POINT, DIES

WHITTAKER TURNS FUN TO PROFITS

CANTON, Ohio, (UP) — When Clyde Erisey was a boy he liked to whittle. He still does, but now instead of carving the dining room table or the back of the church pew on a Sunday, he shapes rough pieces of wood delicately, accurately, with fine tools into the original shapes of complex metal machinery.

Erisey is a patternmaker and it is his wooden patterns which, pressed into sand, make the impressions into which molten metal is poured to form metal castings. In 35 years he has learned just about every trick of the trade. "About the hardest thing," he said, "is making the patterns so they can't warp or shrink. I've been making them ever since I was 16 years old—started back in Alliance, Ohio, when I was just a kid—and I still don't always get 'em just right. If you let 'em get damp—and a change in the weather will do it—why you just have to start all over again."

Erisey has worked as a patternmaker in 22 different shops in northeastern Ohio since he landed his first job when he was 16.

"Next to whittling, what I like best is to tinker around my farm—I raise fruit and vegetables and chickens—go to a good baseball game. But give me a piece of wood and a sharp knife or chisel, and I'm happy."

SCIENCE STUDIES SEA COLORATION

LA JOLLA, Cal. — (UP) — "Red water," which has appeared in the Pacific ocean off points 2000 miles apart during the past months, has started scientists of the University of California's Scripps Institution of Oceanography on a study of the phenomenon. The coloration is known to be caused by the presence of vast masses of minute microscopic organisms, called diatoms, but there still is much to be learned about the cause and nature of red water.

Early last June Dr. W. E. Allen of the institution found a particular manifestation of this phenomenon—the water was so red it seemed the color of blood and became so dense that it interfered with fishing activities near the Coronado Islands. It was estimated that the area of "red water" was 25 or 30 miles long by 10 miles wide. The phenomenon, it was determined, was caused by the same form of marine life which was responsible for wholesale destruction of inshore animal life along the southern California coast in 1901. Earlier in May, a similar manifestation was noted off Seaside, Washington, north of the Columbia river. Here the coloring was attributed to a Plankton diatom which had been previously noted in northern waters but never before in such abundance.

Another type of diatom was responsible for a similar coloration of Copalis beach, north of Gray's Harbor, Ore., the previous day. It extended some distance out to sea.

Truck Brings Fortune. — KALGOORLIE, Australia. (UP) — A dilapidated truck that cost P. J. Pass \$80 brought him a fortune. The truck stalled and while repairing it Pass picked up a lump of gold-bearing quartz. Pass staked a claim near the spot and shortly thereafter the Goldfields Australian Development company took out a \$50,000 option on his land.

Bounty on Groundhogs — EDWARDSVILLE, Ill. (UP) — Madison county officials have decided to dispense with the proverbial spring weather forecast services of the groundhog. The board of supervisors appropriated \$1,000 to pay a bounty of 25 cents on each groundhog killed in the county until July, 1939.
