

FRANCE WORRIED AS TO BRITAIN'S STAND IN CRISIS

Public Proclamation That
England Will Defend In-
tegrity of Czechoslovakia
Is Sought by Ambassador

PARIS, Sept. 9.—(AP)—With French nervousness regarding Britain's position in the German-Czech crisis increasing, diplomatic circles reported today that Charles Corbin, French ambassador to London, had been instructed to ask the British government to proclaim publicly that it would defend the territorial integrity of Czechoslovakia.

A high foreign office official said he was unable "either to confirm or deny" this report.

Some sources also said Corbin had been told to ask Britain to take "defensive security measures" similar to those taken by France in putting her army, navy and air force on a preparedness footing.

Firm Stand Wanted

The belief was widely held as long as Hitler has the impression he can hope for new British pressure on Prague he will continue to demand more and more of the Czechoslovak government.

The French ambassador's reported actions were followed by increasingly numerous expressions of doubt in government and diplomatic quarters. British Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain was maintaining a firm stand on the issue between Germany and Czechoslovakia.

Informal French quarters held

Britain must clearly impress on Hitler her determination to join France if war comes over the sudeten German dispute.

Either a public declaration or firm representations at Nurnberg, where Hitler is attending the annual Nazi congress, is necessary to convince the Führer "Britain means business," they declared.

They also expressed fear a wavering policy on the part of Chamberlain's government might alienate sympathy for France and Great Britain in the United States.

Prepare For War

Leaves of employees in the government-owned communications system were cancelled by Premier-defense Minister Daladier, extending similar precautionary measures already applied to the army, navy and air force.

Navy reserve officers here received official notices advising them to be ready for duty if necessary.

Telegraph, telephone and postal workers disclosed they were ordered to remain near their posts in view of "international difficulties of these critical days."

While officers and sailors of the French Atlantic fleet hurried back to their warships which were loading supplies and munitions for 60 days of service, the army checked up on its defenses of the Pyrenees frontier opposite insurgent Spain.

Gen. Alfred Fagade, commander of the 16th corps area, completed a detailed survey of the frontier west of Andorra, paying particular attention to anti-aircraft defenses.

In Paris, political observers attached considerable importance to the fact Premier Daladier had long interviews yesterday with both the American ambassador, William C. Bullitt, and Sir Eric Phipps, the British ambassador. Bullitt also saw Foreign Minister Bonnet.

Along the Maginot line new commanders, named yesterday, quickly took over their posts. With the underground fortresses in second line defenses virtually at full wartime strength, the stream of reservists moving to the frontier began to dwindle.

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3 AERO AUTHORITY OFFICIALS COMING TO MEETING HERE

Three men associated with the new federal civil aeronautics authority will attend the Northwest Aviation Planning Council conference here next Friday and Saturday, it was announced today by A. H. Banwell, program chairman.

The men are Robert H. Hinkley, member of the authority, Col. W. Sumpter Smith, air safety board of the authority, and Earl P. Ward, chief of the authority's airways operations.

Confirmation that the three officials would attend the Medford conference was contained in a telegram received today by Mr. Banwell from David J. Frizzell, secretary of the authority.

J. N. James, associated with the Western Air Express at Burbank, Cal., will participate in the round-table session on the location and construction of airports, Mr. Banwell said.

Mr. Banwell received notice today that Gov. Clarence D. Martin of Washington had appointed Charles L. Smith to the general committee to fill the vacancy caused by the death of W. W. Conner, Mr. Smith, former mayor of Seattle, had already accepted a part on the conference program.

CENTRAL PT. GYM FINANCING VOTED

In a special election Wednesday, residents of the Central Point school district voted 68 to 20 in favor of a bond issue in the maximum amount of \$8,000 to provide the district's share of the cost of the contemplated \$15,000 new gymnasium. Polling place was the high school building.

An application for a grant of approximately \$2700 has been filed with the Public Works Administration, the sum, in case the grant is approved, to complete the cost of the project.

The new gym, if the PWA money is forthcoming, will be located on the school grounds. Principal H. P. Jewett said it will be 70 by 90 feet in dimension, with an additional wing for shower and equipment rooms. It will enclose a 40 by 80-foot basketball court. Plans and specifications for the building have been drawn by Clark and Keeney, Medford architects.

GIRL ABSOLVED IN COVADONGA DEATH

MIAMI, Fla., Sept. 9.—(AP)—A coroner's jury today absolved Mildred Gaydon, 25-year-old night club girl, of any blame in the automobile accident in which the Count of Covadonga, former heir to the Spanish throne, suffered fatal injuries Tuesday.

Authorities indicated a manslaughter charge against her would be dropped.

Miss Gaydon listened to the testimony given the jury, sobbing at times, but did not take the stand. Jack Fleming, the count's secretary, said he had been anxious no blame should attach to her.

"It wasn't Millie's fault and for God's sake, Jack, don't let anything happen to her," he quoted Covadonga as saying in the hospital. "If I hadn't grabbed the steering wheel the accident never would have happened."

SUSPENDED SENTENCE FOR FORGER OF CHECK

Harold Lester Fort, a transient, charged with obtaining property under false pretenses, and who entered a plea of guilty two weeks ago, was granted a six months' suspended sentence today by Circuit Judge H. D. Norton.

One condition of the suspension provides Fort "particularly abstain from the use of liquor." Fort's previous good record and conduct were taken into consideration by the court.

Fort, according to the complaint, passed a spurious check upon the Montgomery Ward store for a small amount, with no funds in the Klamath Falls bank upon which the check was drawn.

Two Fatalities.

SALEM, Sept. 9.—(AP)—Two fatalities were among 893 accidents reported during the week-end yesterday to the state industrial accident commission. Fatalities were Celestin W. Delpepe, Brandon faller, injured August 25, and Henry Hein, Portland welder, injured August 16.
