

FORCED WEDDINGS ARE OFTEN HAPPY, OFFICIALS STATE

EL PASO, Tex.—(UP)—Despite unconventional beginnings, marriages-in-hate turn out as happily and successfully as society-approved marital unions, Roy D. Chitwood, district attorney's investigator who has played cupid in many a delayed ceremony, reports.

"Such weddings result in happy children and happy parents alike," he said.

It is one of Chitwood's duties to investigate and make recommendations in cases of seduction brought to the district attorney's office. Most of the complaints are made by young women who are expectant mothers. Sometimes parents complain because their daughters are too young to marry without permission.

Four out of five of the hesitating grooms are contented after they have become reconciled to the situation, Chitwood said.

If such cases are prosecuted and the defendant is convicted, he is subject to a penitentiary sentence. Under these conditions, Chitwood finds that little argument is needed usually for the man in the case to decide that marriage is the best solution.

"I simply talk with the boy—for in most cases the man is usually little more than a grown boy—and convince him that the moral thing to do is to marry the girl. Sometimes he objects until we prepare a seduction complaint, but seldom after that."

Texas law prohibits a man who marries under these circumstances from obtaining a divorce for three years, and then only for good and sufficient cause.

"Four out of five of these marriages eventually are successful, and that is about as good a record as those established in conventional weddings," Chitwood said. "I have the couples report to me periodically, and most of the time the groom falls in love with the girl, and often the first child is only the beginning of a fine, big family."

Justice of the Peace C. M. Wilcher, Jr., who officiates at many of Chitwood's marital promotions, supported the investigator's contentions.

"Last year I married exactly 100 couples, and about 40 per cent of these were of the unconventional variety," Wilcher said. "I have talked to brides and grooms months after they were married and they apparently were as happy as if their wedding had been more conventional."

TWO AUTOS DAMAGED BY FIRE AT GARAGE; CONTROL JOB PRAISED

A potentially dangerous fire in the Rogue River Chevrolet service shop at 32 North Riverside avenue early this morning badly damaged a 1934 Graham sedan owned by Chester Jones of 31 Myers street and damaged one side of a new Chevrolet sedan. Ceiling of the shop was damaged somewhat by smoke.

The fire was attributed by Chief Roy Elliott to a short circuit in the switch under the panel of the Graham. Mechanics had worked on the car until 11:30 last night when the shop was closed, the chief said. The fire department received the call at 12:30 a. m. and a chemical crew was dispatched.

Firemen found the Graham in flames after subduing the flames. Firemen rolled the car outside and completed the job of putting the fire out. The men were complimented for their quick work and suppressing the fire and preventing its spread.

The upholstery, steering assembly and top of the Graham were ruined and the car was generally badly damaged, Chief Elliott reported. Standing near the flaming car, the new Chevrolet was scorched on one side.

PROHIBITION REVIVED AS FACTOR IN SOME CAMPAIGN SECTORS

Clackamas county petitions were being checked yesterday, the closing of the filing period. Vincent said they apparently would fall short of the number needed to put the local option question on the ballot. Counties definitely voting are Yamhill and Tillamook. Multa also will vote on drying up the town.

Newberg, previously dry under local option, will vote on legalizing liquor within its municipal boundaries under the Knox state-control law. Eugene petitions were not filed before the deadline, Vincent said he

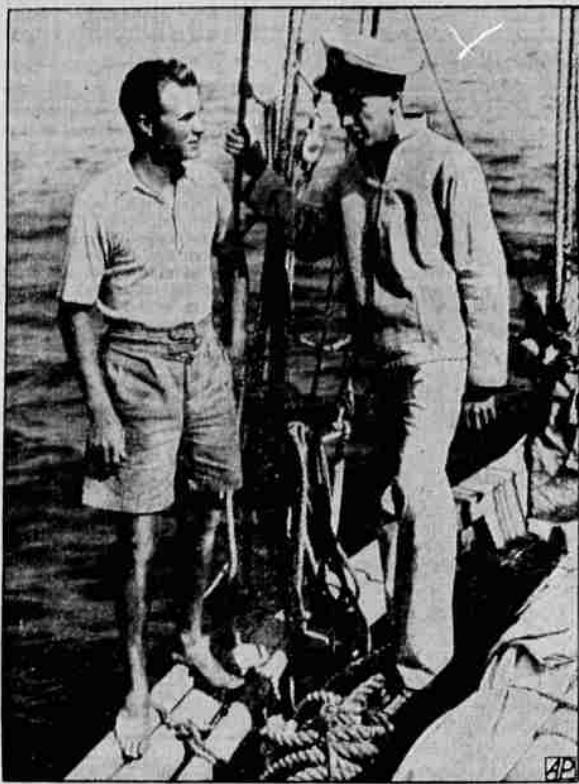
