Hints for Housewives

To remove mustard stains from washable fabrics merely wash the stained area in warm water and mild soap suds.

Mint gelatin mold topped with salad dressing or mayonnaise makes a tasty accompaniment for lamb, hot or cold.

Allow peaches, pears, apricots or plums to ripen at room temperature. Then store them, uncovered in a shallow tray or metal container in the refrigerator.

Here's a simple way to wash windows. Dip a chamomis skin into hot water and wring it quite dry.

Starch slip covers a little when you launder them. That will make them a little more glossy and give them more body.

Grated raw carrots give cabbage salad added color and flavor. Minced green peppers or pimientos will do the same for creamed potatoes, turnips, cauliflower, lima beans or corn.

Black Keeps Domination Over Day Wear; Sport Togs Bright

By Audrey Ames United Press Staff Correspondent PARIS (UP)—As always, black predominates for daytime wear in Molyneux's new fall clothes collections; but sports clothes lean noticeably toward brilliant materials and tweeds.

Evening silhouettes fall into three classes: the straight classical Molyneux type; a new "old-fashioned" silhouette with a low décolleté and a high puffed sleeve reaching not quite to the wrist—such as Toulouse-Lautrec painted; and a third evening line essentially crinolone although the wired fullness does not start until the skirt has already come tightly down over the hips.

Materials are quilted both for daytime coats and evening coats. Plain black velvet evening dresses are worn under coats lined in brilliant satin quilting.

Siberian lynx is a leading fur trimming at the house of Molyneux for morning jackets, three-quarter coats and dressy full length coats. Astrakhan and beaver are worked in narrow tubes as a novel trim for dark wool suits and even dresses.

Black morning dresses have embroidered necklines taken from Japanese necklaces; and typical slim straight Molyneux dresses combine two shades

(Contributed) The Apostolic Faith, at Central Avenue and Third, are entering into their fall and winter campaign with real earnestness, and every effort will be put forth to evangelize the Rogue river valley.

Since the organization went into their new building last spring, there has been a marked increase in attendance, and numbers have been converted.

During the midsummer weeks, scores of Medford folk connected with the Medford branch attended the camp meeting in Portland which was reported to be the largest and most successful in the history of the work.

At this time a transfer of leaders is being made. Rev. D. L. Myers and Rev. George Seelye, who have been in charge of the Medford work for a number of years, are moving with their families to Portland, to be at the headquarters. Rev. C. W. Frost, assisted by Rev. Edna L. Damron, will be in charge of the work in Medford.

Reverend Frost has been connected with the southern Oregon work at Medford and at Klamath Falls, more or less since its opening here, and is well known in the Rogue river valley, he himself having been converted in this district. The Rev. Mrs. Damron has labored extensively in the Apostolic Faith work for thirty years, and though new to Medford, is not a stranger to most of the people who worship at Central and Third.

Also workers from Portland will occasionally be down over week-ends to assist in the meetings.

The Hammond electric, the 25-piece orchestra, and the 15-voice chorus, which furnish the music for this progressive church, will give a sacred concert at the beginning of the Sunday evening meeting, and have part in each of the services. The personal testimonies at each service

are always interesting and inspiring, and the preaching is on the fundamental truths of the good old Book. In fact, the style of all the services is that of the old time Camp Meetings, with lots of music, live testimonials, fiery preaching, and an old-fashioned altar where prayer meetings follow every service.
