Famed Pilot Coming
Speaker at the Saturday luncheon will be Maj.-Gen. Oscar Westover of Washington, D. C., chief of the army air corps.

Delegates to the two-day conference are expected to start arriving here tomorrow. Among those due here tomorrow is Walter L. Sells, vice president and general manager of the Wilmington-Catalina Airline, Ltd., which connects the mainland of southern California with the pleasure island.

Mr. Sells has been flying planes since the early days of the World war and has had many thrilling experiences. He was a pilot in the United States navy during the war and holds a citation for an aerial bombing and sinking of a German submarine.

Pilots Film Stars
Since becoming affiliated with the Catalina airline several years ago Mr. Sells has frequently piloted company planes used in motion pictures made on and around the island. As a result he is prominently known in Hollywood film circles. He owns a large volume of autographed photographs of motion picture stars.

At the aviation conference here Mr. Sells will represent the Wrigley interests which own practically all of Catalina island.

Mr. Sells is motoring to Medford and is being accompanied by Mrs. Sells and their daughter Loren.

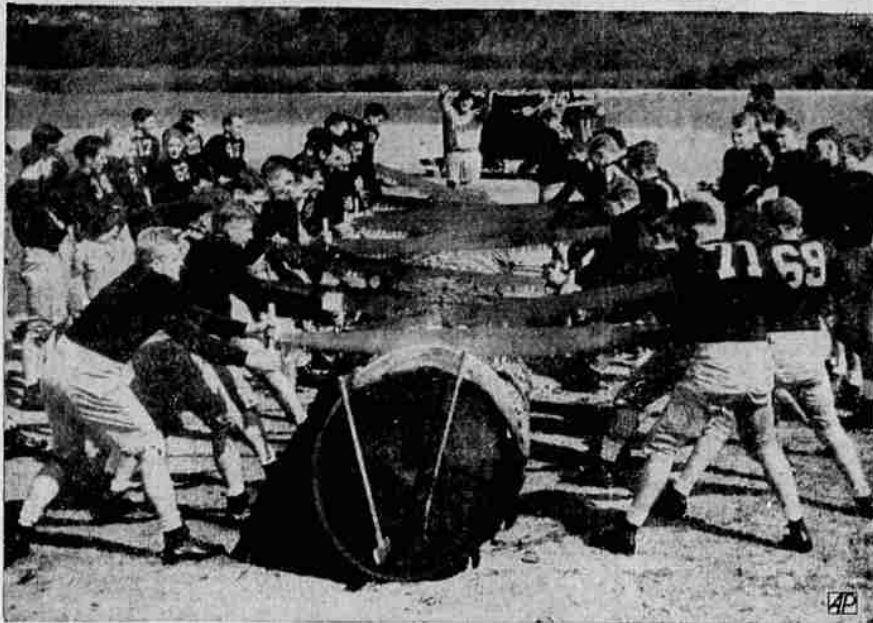
Other officers elected were Dr. Charles P. Johnson, Medford, vice-president, and Dr. Raymond E. Walker, Ashland, secretary-treasurer.

ington Democrats chose Sen. Homer T. Bone over Otto A. Case, a Townsendite. Sen. Carl Hayden, Arizona Democrat, was far ahead of two opponents in incomplete returns.

Voters yesterday showed a general tendency to renounce present house members, but South Carolina was an exception. Rep. John C. Taylor was defeated by Butler B. Hare and Rep. G. Heyward Mahon by Joseph R. Bryson in Democratic run-offs.

South Carolina also supplied the most dramatic election incident of the day when national guardsmen under instructions from Gov. Olin D. Johnston took possession of Charleston county ballot boxes.

Wyndham M. Manning, apparently beaten for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination by Mayor Burnet R. Maybank of Charleston, had asked for the troops because of reported "irregularities."

In New Hampshire, John L. Sullivan

had no opposition for the Democratic nomination for governor. Gov. Francis P. Murphy, wealthy industrialist, won over Atty. Gen. Thomas P. Cheney.

Rep. Charles W. Tobey defeated two rivals in New Hampshire's Republican senatorial race.

Alken Wins In Vermont
Across the state line in Vermont, Gov. George D. Alken, Republican, won renomination by a wide margin. Democratic aspirants to Vermont's state and national offices had no opposition.

Michigan Republicans called on former Gov. Frank D. Fitzgerald to battle Frank Murphy, Democratic incumbent, for the governorship in November. Murphy was unopposed in the primary.

Partial returns from Colorado gave Gov. Teller Ammons, Democrat, a long lead over George J. Knapp, Archibald A. Lee and Ralph L. Carr had no contests for the Republican senatorial and gubernatorial nominations, respectively.

Other Republican senatorial nominees in the west were: Utah, Dr. Franklin S. Harris, president of Brigham Young university; Washington, Ewing D. Colvin, Seattle attorney; and Arizona, Burt L. Clingan, unopposed.

A four-man contest for Arizona's Democratic gubernatorial nomination developed into a tight race, with State Sen. R. T. Jones and Secretary of State James H. Kerby out in front. Jerrie W. Lee had no opposition for the Republican nomination.

CZECH POLICE IN BLOODY CLASHES WITH ATTACKERS

Virtual mobilization of Czechoslovak troops in Sudeten territory appeared to be under way.

Troops Dispatched
Thousands of troops were seen being transported by railway trains and by highway to the troubled centers. There was no confirmation in Prague of reports of troop mobilization in the Sudeten country, and foreign office spokesmen denied numerous rumors had been called to duty.

One report said two Czechoslovaks were killed in a clash at Komotau, but there was no immediate confirmation.

Martial law was extended to that district today.

The foreign office early this afternoon reported the affair at Schwaderbach was only a Sudeten German demonstration, but later it corrected its report to say at least eight of the Czech gendarmes were killed and said the death list probably would be higher.

Negotiations Off
Konrad Henlein, leader of the Sudeten Germans, informed the British Runciman mediation mission today the Sudeten committee for negotiations with the Czechoslovak government had been dissolved.

As a result there is a complete breakdown in efforts to solve the bitter, bloody dispute over the Sudeten's demands for self rule, there being no machinery on the Sudeten side for further discussion.

Meanwhile the government, ignoring the Sudeten's ultimatum demanding cessation of martial law in Sudeten regions, commanded motor buses in Prague to rush fresh troops into the regions under military control. The ultimatum expired early today, without immediate results.

The Sudeten party is conducted on the leadership principle—following the Nazi German model—therefore Henlein as fuhrer alone has authority to discuss anything with the Prague government.

It was estimated that more than a million citizens of Czechoslovakia were subjected to the stern regulations of defense of the realm acts (martial law). Soldiers were in control of regions in which disturbances following Adolf Hitler's Nurnberg speech of Monday night resulted in the deaths of at least 17 persons.

Increased American interest in developments here was indicated by a visit to Foreign Minister Kamil Krofta by Wilbur J. Carr, United States minister. After this conference Krofta returned to the almost continuous deliberations of the cabinet inner council at the war department.

NURSE HURT IN CRASH REPORTED RECOVERING

The condition of Miss Mary Burke, 23-year old San Jose, Cal., nurse who was injured in the Grater Lake highway automobile accident Monday which resulted in the death of her companion, Edna Jones, was reported by Community hospital attendants today as satisfactory. Miss Burke sustained cuts and bruises on her body, and although it was feared at first she may have suffered internal in-

juries, further examination revealed none, hospital attendants reported. The body of Miss Jones was shipped to San Jose last night for burial.

WILL SURVEY BIDS ON EIGHT ROAD PROJECTS

SALEM, Sept. 14.—(AP)—Bids on eight road projects, involving \$300,000 in construction, will be opened by the state highway commission in Portland September 29.

Projects include: Klamath county—Grading 8.75 miles, topping 9.35 miles and surfacing and cutting 1.75 miles of Crooked Creek-Lobert section of The Dalles-California highway.

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
