Editorial Correspondence

PORTLAND, Sept. 13.—Whether we will be able to get out of this man's town without becoming a member of the Spanish war veterans, remains to be seen.

We got the last room in the hotel and then only after a heart breaking appeal to our grey hairs, and long record of patronage. We might not have argued so vehemently if we had known what we were going to get—a single room on the second floor without bath.

We didn't (as usual) know we were running into a great national convention or we would at least have wired for accommodations in advance.

Not that we would object to being a Spanish war veteran—far from it! We never saw a convention that had more fun to the square inch—and quart,—than this one.

And the nearest we came to joining the army in 1898, was when a neighboring young man, Bill Taleott, did, and we wanted to for we wanted to do everything he did, as far as it was humanly possible.

And that was true of the Spanish war of course,—not Spanish bullets but dirty little bugs got most of the gallant young volunteers from the United States.

And it was a VOLUNTEER army—the army that went to training camp in the south and later to Cuba and the Philippines. That fact is apparent at this convention,—even though the veterans look surprisingly ancient.

Of course there is drinking—it's always "WET" weather when war veterans get together,—but as far as we have observed absolutely no drunkenness,—no swaggering about or unpleasantness of any sort.

At the news stand this morning one of the older boys, gay with ribbons and medals and sporting khaki leggings and campaign hat, picked up an Oregonian, glanced at the front page and remarked "Good, this man Tydings is way out in front,—guess it just shows even the PRESIDENT has to do right!"

He was very serious about it,—no doubt at all he really believed the moral code had been vindicated, and the President in trying to defeat members of his own party who by principle and conviction did not belong to it, was breaking some genuine but indefinite political commandment.

Of course, we can't agree with that. The President not only had a perfect moral right to try to defeat members of his own party, who by principle and action never belonged to it, but in this branching out alone to purge the Democratic party and form a new one, he demonstrated, both the depth and strength of his political convictions, and his moral courage.

Nevertheless we are genuinely glad he was beaten, and believe his defeat in this effort, will in its net results, be good for him and for the country. And that is the important thing, particularly the latter.

If the President had won all along the line in this purge, nothing could have prevented the popular impression that the victory had been "bought," that Roosevelt won primarily because of his great powers particularly over the expenditure of relief funds, and his determination to become a dictator with only "yes men" in congress.

Now there is no doubt that the Democratic rank and file of Maryland, as the rank and file in South Carolina, California, Iowa and other states, refused to vote as their President requested, and voted,—as 90% of the citizens of this country have always voted and we hope always will—as they deserved pleased, strictly according to the dictates of their own consciences.

As in all the states there have been plenty of government funds, and innumerable ways to exert pressure, the failure of the purge must demonstrate one of two things, even to those who think F. D. R. is the evil one incarnate:
