

COUNTY 4-H CLUB STOCK FAIR, SALE SET FOR SEPT. 23

Gala Event Will Be Held at Riverside and 5th—Animals Groomed for Parade—Rotary Club Is Sponsor

Plans for a gala Jackson county 4-H club livestock fair and fat stock auction here Friday September 23 were virtually completed at a committee meeting yesterday afternoon at the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce.

The event, sponsored by the Rotary club, will be held at Riverside avenue and 5th street, the site being chosen because of its central location. This is the first time that such an event has been held within the city and because of its convenient location it is expected to attract thousands of visitors from southern Oregon.

It was brought out at yesterday's committee meeting that 150 head of livestock will be exhibited by the 4-H clubs of the county. In the big exhibit will be dairy and beef cattle, hogs and poultry.

Parade Starts Fair
The fair will open formally with a festive parade through the business district at 10:30 Friday morning. All the livestock to be exhibited will march in the procession, the parade to be led by the senior high school girls, fife and drum corps.

The boys and girls of the participating 4-H clubs have been working for weeks in grooming their animals for the fair and parade and it is anticipated that some outstanding livestock will be seen.

An arena is to be erected with plenty of seats for the comfort of visitors. A loud-speaker system will be installed so that all may hear what is going on. The exhibits and the arena will be under tents. Erection of the tents will be started next Tuesday under the supervision of C. D. Conrad, county 4-H club agent.

At 1:30 p. m. special awards will be presented to the club winners. At 3 p. m. the fat stock auction sale will be conducted with Col. A. H. Dudley as auctioneer.

The Rotary committee in charge of the event comprises Ben E. Harder, chairman, Lee Bishop, Elmer Wilson, Bob Wright, Charles A. Wing, Judge Earl B. Day and W. Harold Reichstein. Meeting with the committee yesterday were Mr. Conrad and Robert G. Fowler, county agent.

GOODMAN GAINS QUARTER FINALS WITH HOT PUTTER

OAKMONT COUNTRY CLUB, OAKMONT, Pa., Sept. 15.—(AP)—Dick Chapman of Greenwich, Conn., playing in his first national amateur championship, topped defending titleholder John Goodman, Omaha, from his throne today with a stunning 2 and 1 upset to reach the semi-finals.

OAKMONT COUNTRY CLUB, OAKMONT, Pa., Sept. 15.—(AP)—Defending Champion Johnny Goodman, Omaha, played hot and cold golf today to advance to the quarter-finals of the national amateur championship with a 4 to 2 victory over James French, Jr., San Francisco.

Johnny, his putter afire, broke par by three shots with an out-going 34 to grab a 5-up lead, but shot the next five holes in bogey, trimming his margin to two holes. He won the 15th and 16th in par as French was short and trapped.

Pat Abbott, movie extra from Hollywood, joined Goodman, beating James (Sonny) Fraser, Atlantic City, 2-up, square through 16, Abbott won the 16th as his rival over-shot the green and the 18th by laying Fraser a dead stymie.

Joe Thompson, sole Canadian survivor, won his second extra hole match in succession in disposing of Walter Blevins, Kansas City, in 19 holes.

Mei Harbert of Battle Creek, Mich., scored an upset by eliminating Medalist Gus Moreland, Peoria, Ill., 3 and 2. Harbert broke par with an out 36 to take a 4-up lead and never was threatened.

Ed Kingsley, another long shot from Magna, Utah, survived with a 4 and 3 decision over Wilfred Crossley, Dedham, Mass.

Dick Chapman, Greenwich, Conn., Goodman's quarter final foe, won after a hard match with his chum, Tommy Teller, New York, 2 and 1, ending the duel on the 17th by dropping a 17-foot putt for a birdie 3.

Christian Brinke, Jr., Detroit city champion, added to the upsets, licking Frank Strafaci, Brooklyn, 3 and 2.

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SOLONS TO VISIT NAVAL DEFENSES IN WESTERN AREA

Committee Boards Naval Transport Plane for Ten-Day Jaunt—Will Reach Salem September 22.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.—(P)—Members of a special sub-committee of the Washington naval affairs committee left today aboard a naval transport plane for a 10-day inspection of west coast naval bases and defenses.

The big transport, which carried Representatives Cole (R., N. Y.) and Bates (R., Mass.), was to pick up Representative Scrugham (D., Nev.) at Las Vegas, Nev., and Representatives Mott (R., Ore.) and Magnuson (D., Wash.) and Scott (D., Calif.) at San Diego, Saturday.

Lieut. Robert S. Purvis, Jr., was at the controls when the plane took off from the Anacostia naval field.

Committee aides said the trip was intended to give members first-hand information for use in drafting legislation to strengthen or expand Pacific coast defenses.

The congressmen planned to inspect the various naval activities in the San Diego, Calif., area Saturday, Sunday and Monday they will go to San Pedro, Calif., where the Pacific fleet makes its headquarters and to the Long Beach naval reserve base.

They will inspect the flying field at Sunnydale, Calif., Tuesday and motor to Hunters Point to look over the Bethlehem Shipbuilding Company plant. The following day they will go to the San Francisco area to inspect Mare Island naval yard and the site of the proposed naval supply base at Oakland.

They will proceed to Salem, Ore., September 22 and motor the following day to Astoria, at the mouth of the Columbia river and to Portland. From Portland they will proceed to Puget sound area for an inspection of naval facilities in that area.

3 BRUSH FIRES COMPLETELY OUT

Three small brush and grass fires occurring yesterday on land under the protection of the state forest department were reported completely out today. All were man-caused, the district warden's office said.

One blaze was on the edge of Bear canyon the other side of the Siskiyou. It covered ten acres of brush and was started by tourists who stopped at the side of the road and evidently discarded lighted cigarettes, the warden's office said.

Fifty CCC men from Camp Winier and six men from the state forest office here put the fire out, completing a patrol of the area this forenoon.

Two acres of brush and grass were burned on Griffin creek. A crew of four men and a pump from here extinguished the blaze. An acre of brush was burned on Dry creek northeast of Table Rock. Four men put the fire out.

The haze of smoke over the valley today was attributed to mill operations and the burning of stubble fields under permit.

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Progress Noted on 12th Year of Coast Air Line

Just 12 years ago today, a group of helmeted and goggles pilots clambered into the open cockpits of single-engine planes at this and that field along the Pacific coast, waved to throngs of spectators, opened up the throttles and inaugurated scheduled air service between Seattle, Portland, Medford and southern California.

Today, a corps of smartly uniformed men walked into the pilots' compartments of giant twin-engine cabin transport planes, waited for the "go ahead" from dispatchers and flew their regular schedules up and down the Pacific coast airway. Thus did

United Air Lines celebrate the 12th birthday of its coastwise route. Thus, also, did several of United's captains observe the twelfth anniversary of their service on the border-to-border line. Among them was Capt. Grover Tyler who flew the first northbound schedule on the Pacific northwest leg of the route on September 15, 1926, and who today was in charge of United's regular southbound afternoon Mainliner flying over Medford.

When the operations were begun twelve years ago, single-engine ships carrying only their pilots and mail established one daily round-trip over

the run, with 14 hours required to get from Seattle to Los Angeles. Now, United's twin-engine Mainliners, capable of carrying 21 passengers, two pilots, a stewardess, baggage, mail and express, do the same 1100 miles in slightly over seven hours. Meanwhile, the frequency of trips has also grown.

Irrigation Season Seen Nearing End

The irrigation season for the Rogue River valley will close between September 20 and October 1, Olen Arrispiger, general manager of the Talent and the Medford districts said today.

No irrigation water is now being used except for cover crops, and the main irrigation volume use has passed. Arrispiger states. The current hot spell has not increased irrigation water use, he said.

SUMMER HOME ROBBER GIVEN 4-YEAR TERM

TOLEDO, Sept. 15.—(P)—Francis Fisher, 27, of Portland, today was on his way to the state penitentiary to begin a four year and nine month term for the robbery of a Portland police officer's home and other summer cottages along the Lincoln county coast. Reversing his former plea of innocent, Fisher pleaded guilty and was sentenced by Circuit Judge Carl Wimberley.

The charge arose when Fisher was apprehended with two companions, previously sentenced on pleas of guilty, with a car full of stolen goods from the home of Ferdinand C. Gauntt near Newport.

ROGUE VALLEY SMOKE DUE TO SLASH FIRES

GRANTS PASS, Sept. 15.—(P)—Dense clouds of smoke, attributed by State Fire Warden John Kincaid to slashing fires in Douglas counts, darkened Grants Pass Wednesday afternoon.

A few residents were alarmed, recalling two brush fires at city limits this summer which fire-fighting authorities now say had a 50-50 chance of sweeping into town.

Tension was increased when fire sirens sounded last night. An electric motor in the newly-constructed Riverside school started a small blaze which blackened interior walls.
