

4-H CLUBBERS OF JACKSON COUNTY WIN FAIR AWARDS

Eleven Members Among Honored List — Chester Riggs Repeats 1st Award On Woodworking Exhibit

Eleven Jackson county 4-H club boys and girls were awarded trophies on their exhibits at the 1938 Oregon state fair, Chester Riggs, who last year placed first in division 1

woodworking at the state fair, again placed first in second year work with a tool box, nail box and step ladder. Virginia Hicks, also of the Howard community and a sister of Chester, placed fifth with her washable dress in a class of 35 entries. Elsie Bradford of Rogue River and Miss Hicks were champions in the style review contest held during the Jackson county 4-H home economics fair August 18 and 19 and represented the county in the state style review contest last week.

Betty Dunn of Bellevue placed sixth with her light bread in division II against 62 other state fair contestants.

Headtable Place. In the division I forestry class, 35 boys and girls exhibited their work with Cecil Martin, Ernest Henderson and Joe Pearl of Beagle placing 3rd, 4th and 5th respectively.

Benton Walsh and Bruce Burton, both of Astoria, placed 6th and 7th in the machine woodworking division.

June Andrews and Lucille Lebow of

Ashland placed 4th with their cooking demonstration and Gwendolyn Charley and Lella Damon of Lake Creek tied with another team for 5th place in the home economics judging contest.

The livestock judging team consisted of Charley Stanley and Louis and Willard Walsh of Brownboro, placed 8th in the state judging contest in which 25 Oregon teams competed.

The boys and girls entering exhibits and competing at the state fair were selected last month at the 4-H club home economics fair and were judged the outstanding exhibitors and contestants in the county at that time.

120 Exhibits. One hundred and seventeen Jackson county boys and girls exhibited their work in the court house auditorium during the two days of the 4-H fair. More than 150 exhibits were on display. Betty Lee Hatch of Oak Grove was given the honor of making the best showing in cooking work while Virginia Hicks of the Howard community was judged

champion in clothing work and Marie Logan of Oak Grove was champion in canning work.

NEW WEATHER BUREAU DEVICES WILL RECORD FULL HURRICANE DATA

WASHINGTON.—(UP)—Now the weather bureau is prepared to make detailed observations of the first full-fledged hurricane that smashes across one of its especially-equipped southern observation stations.

The bureau has equipped seven of its stations with 210 automatic weather recorders which will be released on hydrogen or helium-filled balloons when a hurricane passes over one of the stations. They are located at Raleigh, N. C.; Columbia, S. C.; Macon, Ga.; Vicksburg, Miss.; Montgomery, Ala.; Meridian, Miss.; and Houston, Tex.

The weather recorders—on "meteorographs"—will rise from 10 to 20 miles above the earth and record changes in air pressure, temperature and humidity. They pen points will scratch the record on a plate of smoked glass. When the balloon bursts, the meteorograph will fall to the earth, its shock cushioned by a bamboo frame-work.

"People living in or near the path of a hurricane," the weather bureau announced, "can help the bureau's hurricane study by keeping an eye out for fallen meteorographs, which are easily recognized by their bamboo frames with stripes of red cloth attached to make them more conspicuous. The bureau pays three dollars for the return of each instrument as directed on a tag tied to the case."

The number of meteorographs to be released by each weather station will vary according to the hurricane.

"If the 'eye' of the storm—the calm area, sometimes 10 miles in diameter, in the center of the storm, surrounded by winds that blow at velocities up to 200 miles an hour—

passes directly over a station, the instruments may be released every hour," the bureau said. "As the 'eye' approaches and recedes, they may be released every two or three hours."

KLAMATH LEGION CORPS TO SPREAD PUBLICITY

KLAMATH FALLS, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Klamath Falls state champion American Legion drum corps, on its trip to Los Angeles this week-end to engage in national Legion drum corps competition, will carry a special cargo of Klamath county publicity material to be spread among convention crowds.

Directors of the local chamber of commerce today voted to supply the drum corps with the souvenirs which, in a manner yet to be decided, will feature wooden boxes and pennants.

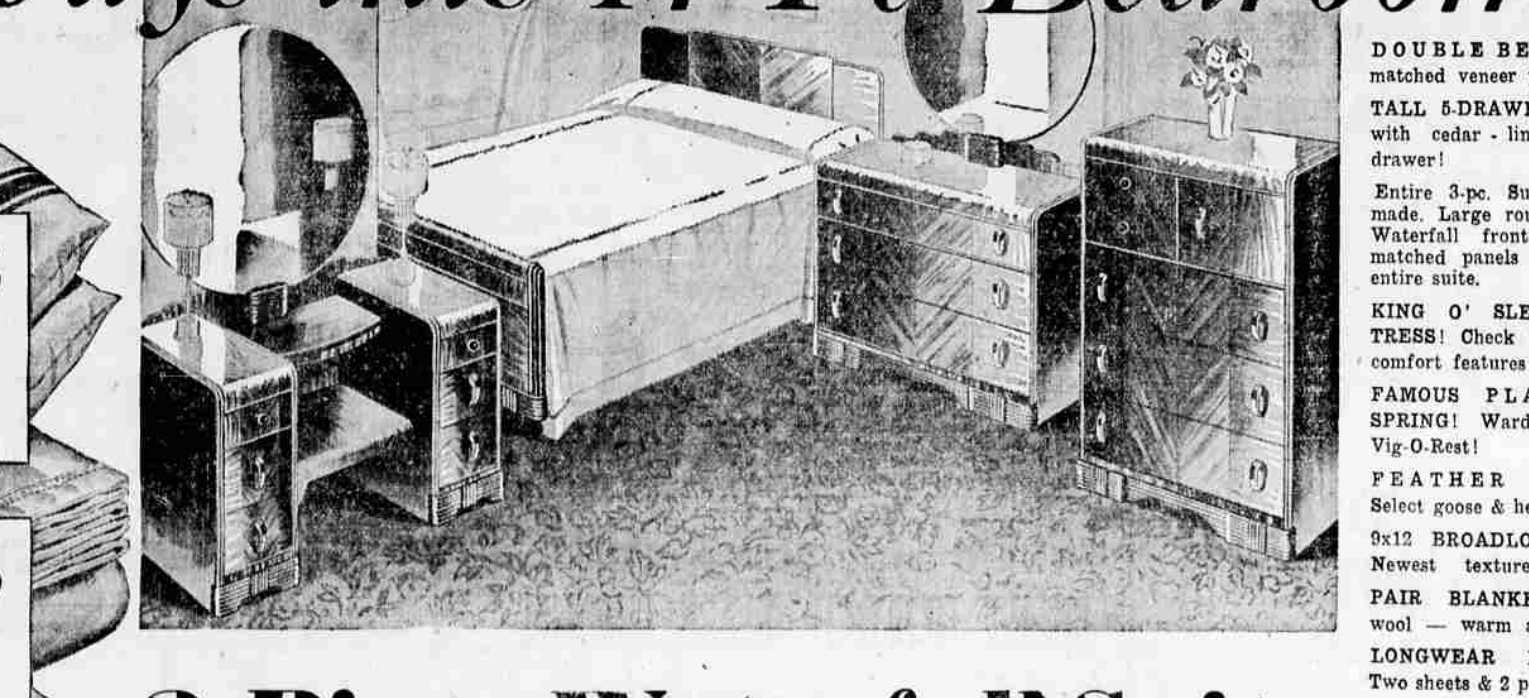
