

TIPS ON PLAYING HORSES AT FAIRS GIVEN BY SCRIBE

Dick Applegate Relates How To Tell Goats From Camels, Mudders, Fadders—Whole Thing Held Unsafe

SALEM (UP)—Betting on the horses at the recent state fair brought \$99,300 through the pari-mutuel machines, but revealed a crying necessity for a simple explanation of the terms used at race tracks. The following glossary of terms

may aid those who care to visit the fair and risk a few guilders next year.
1. Win ticket: This is a ticket for which you pay \$2, naming the horse which you believe will win. After the race the ticket is handy for making confetti, stuffing into the toes of shoes, or in arranging interesting color combinations in your scrap book. The horse on which you hold a ticket will in no event run better than second, in which case you should have a:
2. Place ticket: Which means you think the horse you have selected will either win or run second. It is always safe to buy a place ticket on a horse which you know will win. He has different ideas and refuses to run at all. You are stuck with another useless bit of pasteboard and the horse is stuck at the post. On rare occasions your horse will run third, leaving you out of the money but resolved to enter the next race with a:
3. Show ticket: Which means that you think your horse will be among the first three across the line. The error here is in ever believing the animal you selected was a horse. He might look like a horse in the stall, or even in the paddock, but when

he comes onto the track he reminds you vaguely of a dromedary. This vagueness is quickly dispelled and you are sure he is a dromedary. In desperation you will sell your \$2 ticket for 35 cents, in which case the beast will shed his lethargy at the post and romp home a winner, paying \$204.
Several other terms need a light going over. They are:
Ticket window. This is where you put your money on a goat which can't lose, but always does. Look for the sign above the door reading "Abandon hope all ye who enter here."
Pay window. A mythical establishment supposedly located somewhere in the general neighborhood of the track. You will have no occasion to investigate the matter closer.
Quinella. This is where you select two beasts of burden to come in first and second. One of your two oxen will do this but the second will run just out of the money. In case he had run second you would have won \$233.45, a nice item to keep recalling to friends while touching them for 50 cents on which to eat the ensuing week. Occasionally you will hit

a quinella through sheer stupidity, in which case everyone else at the track will have had the same idea, and you will win \$2.15. Since you paid \$2 for the ticket, the 18 cents is clear profit. This will go to your head, and you will next play a:
Long Shot. Long shots are horses which have never won a race. They are usually "imported from Florida," and look as though they had walked all the way. Odds are posted as 30-1 to 1. You have the profit from your last race to invest, so decide to take a flyer. The odds immediately drop to 10-3, but your horse runs last, which is what made him a long shot in the first place. Occasionally the long shot will come home and pay the fat gentleman in the next box \$199.03. He will tell you he got his information from a:
Tipster. Tipsters are odd-looking men in noisy clothing who will tell you they have word from the stables that "Number 3 goat is a cinch to win in a walk." No. 3 is listed at 40-1 odds. There are two ways to know whether a tipster knows what he is talking about. First way is to take his tip and bet on the horse. It will run last and you will know

the tipster was goofy. Second way is to not bet on the horse, in which case he will run first and you will know you are goofy. Tipsters are very irritating people to have around race tracks. They will be glad, however, to advise you on rainy days which horses are good:
Mudders. A mudder is a horse which runs faster on a sloppy track than he would on a dry one. Only catch in this is that the other horses in the race can do the same thing, and beat your (be) home by many yards. Mudders should stay home with fadders and take care of the children. They are unsafe investments. So are all other horses.
FIND MAJOR BROOKE WAS WIFE'S SLAYER

PART TIME JOB NO BAR TO UNEMPLOYMENT PAY UNDER OREGON SET-UP

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 15.—(Sp.)—Acceptance of part-time or fill-in jobs does not remove Oregon workers from eligibility for unemployment compensation. In fact, the law was so drawn as to encourage partial employment when full-time occupation at regular work is unavailable, according to commission officials.
The Oregon law provides for payment of an amount equal to the difference between a worker's weekly benefit amount and five-sixths of his wages from partial employment. He is considered partially employed if his remuneration for any week is less than five-sixths of the weekly benefit amount he would be entitled to receive if totally unemployed and eligible.
Workers earning \$18 or more automatically would be ineligible for

unemployed compensation inasmuch as this amount is six-fifths of the maximum benefit amount.
Inquiries received at the central office indicate more unfamiliarity with the law's provisions for partial benefits than with most features of the job insurance setup. This has been found true in other states, too, press releases indicate, and some labor unions have adopted plans to make the partial benefits formula to their members.

G. O. P. TO OBSERVE CONSTITUTION DAY

Constitution Day will be observed by the Republican party tomorrow with a nation-wide broadcast over the Columbia system from 6:45 to 7:30 p. m. Stations carrying the broadcast will include KOIN of Portland as well as all the other regular Columbia stations.
Principal feature of the broadcast will be speeches by Sen. Charles L.

McNary of Oregon, Sen. Arthur Capper of Kansas, Congressman Bruce Barton of New York and Robert A. Taft, son of former President Taft and a candidate for the U. S. senate from Ohio.
The Republican state central committee issued a statement through the local committee today saying that the broadcast would be of interest to the public and urging all to tune in.

ANCIENT MARINER DIES WHEN HIT BY MOTORBUS

TACOMA, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Survivor of many a shipwreck and ocean storm, Capt. Edmund C. Weaver, 100-year-old retired mariner, was instantly killed today when struck by a motorbus near his Tacoma home.
John Pollock, bus driver and long time friend of Weaver, said the aged man was in the habit of boarding the bus each morning for a ride to the center of the city, and apparently stepped into its path today when he believed it was about to pass him by in the fog.
